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Art Society Plans Panel Discussions

A monthly series of panel discussions will highlight the 1963-64 program as a season of the Prince Edward Island Art Society.

The discussions will take place on the first Tuesday of every month when a panel of five will examine a period in art history. The material will be presented in a unique or style turned artists in a new direction.

The members of the panel will present the painters most responsible for the change, although the currents in art through the social, political and economic background. The fourth will illustrate the material by presenting slides, prints and books.

All meetings will be held at Prince Wales College, unless otherwise announced, and begin at 8 p.m.

On the third Tuesday of every month members will be invited to a studio workshop where they can practice the techniques discussed in the previous meeting under the guidance of panel members. From time to time invited members will be invited to address members on work shop nights.

A set of notes covering the artists and periods not presented on the program will be offered to members. Sept. 17 will be the opening meeting of the society and the first panel discussion will be on "The Impressionist Movement." The first workshop will be on Oct. 15.

S'side Police Probing Two Weekend Breaks

SUMMERSIDE — Police Chief S. D. A. Wanaamaker yesterday reported that his department has two break and entries, which occurred during the Labor Day weekend, under investigation.

One break was at Smallman's department store on Water Street and the other at the Biss Brothers warehouse on Water Street East.

At Smallman's the intruders are suspected of having broken into the building twice, the first Sunday night and the second Monday night. Clothing and cigarettes of an unidentified value were reported to have been taken.

A complete breakdown and relation of the articles taken cannot be given until an inventory has been taken, store officials said.

Entry into the building is believed to have been made by use of an elevator shaft, after the intruders had climbed to the roof of the Island Telephone building via a fire escape and crossed the roofs of the adjoining properties.

Town police discovered the break at DeBolis Brothers, at about 1:15 Sunday morning, during their regular patrol.

Entry was apparently made by jimmying a front window, but it is believed the would-be thieves were spotted before they had an opportunity to remove anything from the warehouse.

"After 11 1/2 Brussels world's fair was postponed from 1958 to 1959 for probably similar reasons."

The informant also said the city's technical men are studying construction of an extension to a subway being built in Montreal which would not be completed until 1967.

The subway would run under the river to the fair site, and a report will reach the federal government in the next few days; the source added.

Montreal Mayor Jean Drapeau, chief proponent of the mid-St. Lawrence River fair site, discounted the engineers' report.

"Who are these so-called experts?" he said in an interview. "They don't know what they're talking about."

He said all the city of Montreal experts advised the "very intricate" work on the project could be completed in time for the June 1967 deadline.

Mayor Drapeau said he could say more given the names of the engineers.

MCA Takeover Confirmed By Officials At St. John's

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Eastern Provincial Airways has taken over the MCA's Newfoundland routes. The final purchase agreement was signed last week, Andrew Crosbie, vice-chairman of EPA, confirmed.

Mr. Crosbie said MCA President Carl Burke of Charlotte and Canadian Pacific Airlines, Ontario, who between them owned about eight per cent of the MCA, had sold their shares at the meeting Friday. He did not say how much money was paid them in return.

Mr. Crosbie said eventually the EPA might purchase all the MCA's Newfoundland routes, although for the present few changes are planned. "Primarily these changes involve integration of routes and elimination of some terminal points to prevent flights to provide more through service."

Mr. Crosbie said no changes are planned for operations at Moncton. However, some of the MCA's routes are being moved to Gander, Nfld., the EPA headquarters.

Diem Regime Challenges JFK Blast

SAIGON (AP) — A spokesman for President Ngo Dinh Diem said the Diem regime has challenged U.S. President Kennedy's criticism of Diem policies, but welcomed the prospect of continued United States military aid to South Viet Nam.

"As for his criticism of Diem policies, we feel Kennedy's information is inadequate and his judgment is quite wrong," the spokesman said Tuesday.

"Kennedy told TV viewers Monday night the war against Communism might be won in South Viet Nam, and he was wrong," Diem's administration makes greater effort to win popular support.

Some Organizations Prefer To Run Independent Appeals

Spurred by questions as to the United Nations' participation in independent agencies, Frank W. Curtis, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, said yesterday morning that the reason why the United Nations should not be a part of the governing bodies of some agencies is that they are not independent.

Mr. Curtis said that he and his board of directors have made consistent efforts to have these independent agencies established in Canada. A one-step policy in maintained by the United Fund of Canada, which will eventually see fit to join. He noted that all of them are members of the United Funds and Community Chests in other parts of Canada and that local representatives are desirous of having their organizations participate in the United Appeal.

One new agency that made application to participate this year has been turned down, the president said, not being eligible under the present circumstances. However, in this case, it was possible to show a degree of independence from other sources the amount it required.

It has been possible for the U.F.C. to accept a larger share of the financing of the U.F.C. Red Cross this year, Curtis stated. This agency will continue to receive contributions from the province to fulfill its varied program of services but a larger part in its support will be played by P.E.I. in 1964.

Married Status Is Requirement For Attache Post

LONDON (Reuters) — Only married men will be appointed in future as military attachés to British embassies in certain foreign countries, official government sources said Tuesday.

A war office spokesman refused to say when the ruling was made but referred to the Radcliffe report on homosexual cases in the British Foreign Office, which was published in 1958. The report said that homosexuals such as Vassall were vulnerable targets for blackmail by foreign agents.

"Clearly everything Lord Radcliffe had to say has been taken to heart and given the closest consideration," the spokesman said.

He declined to specify the embassies affected by the ruling but political observers believe they included those in sensitive areas such as the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, Poland and other Communist countries.

In addition to the security aspect, married men could be considered more desirable as attachés because they had a wife to assist in the social side of their work, the source said.
