BUSINESS STAND PURCHASED.—The business stand, residence and stock in trade of the late Donald McKay, Esq., at Oyster Bed Bridge, has been purchased by Messrs. Joseph Gallant and Stanislaus Bator, who will carry on the business. We wish the new firm success.

DROPPED SIX THOUSAND.—A late despatch says: P. M. Jenkins came to Halifax from New Glasgow a year ago and started a general commission and produce business, having large connections with P. E. I. Since then he dropped \$6,000. A few days ago he left for Boston.

THE MARKET.—To-day's market was well attended. Inside the supply was about as usual, and quite equal to the demand. Outside, hay was plentiful and moved slowly with a poor demand; oats, about equal and pork scarce, with no great demand. No potatoes were offered for sale, but many were looking for them. We quote prices as follows: Butter, 20 to 22c; eggs, 24 to 26c; geese, 70 to 80c; pork, 5c; hams, 35 to 36c; and hay, 28 to 32c.

NEW BUILDINGS IN HALIFAX.—The contract for the erection of a new building for the deaf and dumb institution at Halifax has been let, and the work will be commenced at once. The building will cost \$43,000.

IT HAS BEEN DECIDED to tear down the present Victoria Infirmary building on Barrington street and erect in its place a handsome brick and stone structure. The new building will cost \$25,000.

VERY SUCCESSFUL.—The basket social at Union Road last night was very successful. There was a large attendance of the residents of Union Road and vicinity, and there were many persons present from Charlottetown. Previous to the sale of baskets an interesting literary and musical programme was disposed of. The basket was "auctioned off" by Mr. L. E. Prowse, M. L. A. The sum of \$40 was realized, which will go towards the organ fund.

HORSES LOST.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian writes: Mr. Monkey, of Lot 16, a son of Mr. George Monkey, lost two valuable horses in Grand River the other day. The horses had previously lived on his father's farm, and on being let out of the stable for water started to cross the river to the other farm, walked into a large hole and were drowned. A horse belonging to Mr. R. McLean, a neighbor, that was with the other two, was also lost.

THE EFFICIENCY COMPETITION.—We learn that No. 1 Company, Garrison Artillery, stands second in the efficiency competition for 1894, as published in the Canada Gazette a week or two ago. It seems that an error occurred in the arrangement of the returns sent to headquarters, the non-commissioned officers of that company not having been given the full number of points to which they were entitled. This very annoying error was not detected until after the returns were gazetted.

CLUB RECEIVED A GOOD DEAL of attention at the quarterly session of the Grand Division, Sons of Penitence, held at St. John's on Wednesday. A resolution was adopted to the effect that the Club is a hindrance to the successful working of the Canada Temperance Act, and calling upon all representative men to sever their connection with it. David Small was elected Grand Worthy Patriarch, in the place of Alexander McKinnon, who resigned because of ill health.

A SLEIGHING ACCIDENT.

Yesterday afternoon, about half-past four o'clock, a team consisting of a horse and wood sledge, and having a second sleigh in tow, caused a large crowd. The cargo consisted of three country men, one of whom was on the front sleigh engineering the horse, and the other two were seated on one of the back seats. A large crowd gathered around the scene, and the sleigh was deeply engaged in conversation. The engineer of the team was evidently in a brown study, and which he was turning the London House corner to go down Bell street, which, under other circumstances, he would have brought into play. In short, he turned the corner rather sharply. As a result, both sleigh took a large size "slew," and the rear-most one would have knocked Johnson & Johnson's plate glass window into smithereens were it not for the electric light post at the corner, against which the vehicle came with a force which caused it to careen and rid itself of its occupants. The solitary occupant of the first sleigh also lost his equilibrium, and measured his length upon the street. A very heavy stunted. The horse was promptly stopped by a gentleman passing by or the consequences might have been serious as the driver held on to the reins. A large crowd gathered quickly, expecting that something really serious had occurred. THE KAISER'S ARMY.

On the occasion of the thirty-sixth birthday of the German Emperor, the Emperor's address to the army notes that for the twenty-fifth time the memorial day comes round of the great war which was forced upon the Fatherland and which after a path of victory without parallel, brought it to a glorious ending, fulfilled Germany's longings, and, as the noblest recompense for her sacrifices, created an unshakable foundation for her greatness and welfare in the federation of her princes and peoples. With touched hearts we glorify the memory of the Almighty that He blessed our arms in such measure of full sympathy. Upon the army before all, the duty falls of preserving the memory of that time among the generations enjoying the fruits of the victories. To this end I ordain, in order to grant my troops a visible symbol of their proud memories that July 15 to May 10, 1895, wherever the colors and standard to which my grandfather, the great emperor and king, granted distinction for participation in this war are displayed, they shall be decorated with oak leaves, and that the first guns of these batteries which fought in the conquest shall be decorated with oak leaves. May my army remain ever mindful that only fear of God, fidelity and obedience can render it capable of deeds such as those that made its own and Fatherland's greatness.

This forenoon while E. N. McLean, a tailor employed in J. T. MacKinnon's establishment, in the London House Block, was skilfully working another workman, he fell upon a scissor, the point of which entered the side of his head near the temple, inflicting a wound which necessitated medical attendance.
