

Two Island Men Receive Honors

Two Prince Edward Island-born men received citations on November 5, at the University of Saskatchewan's annual fall convocation in Saskatoon.

Dr. J. Wendell Macleod, born in Wiltshire, P.E.I., is the executive secretary of the Association of Canadian Medical Colleges and received the honorary degree of doctor of laws. Dr. Macleod graduated in science and medicine from McGill University and became a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in 1938. Then he set up a private practice in Montreal and taught at McGill.

Post-war he received the Order of the British Empire for his services as a surgeon commander in the Royal Canadian Navy volunteer reserve. He entered private practice in Winnipeg and taught at the University of Manitoba. He was then selected as dean of medicine at the University of Saskatchewan.

The second Islander, now living in Saskatoon, is H. L. Fowler, who was born in Ross Corner, and is the retired president of Federative Co-operatives Limited. He was also given the honorary degree of doctor of laws.

After an education which led him to the career in teaching, Mr. Fowler turned instead to banking, from which he departed in 1922 to enter a farm implement and oil agency. During the depression, he became the manager of an oil distribution co-op, and thereafter his name became linked to the development of the co-operative oil refinery. It came into production in 1935. The Co-ops that have felt his influence have included several of the largest in the province.

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Kensington Teachers Hold Fall Workshop

Kensington Local of P.E.I. — T.F. held their fall workshop at Kinkora Regional High School on Friday, November 4th.

An extremely enlightening talk by Mr. Ken Walker, Athens Regional High brought the teachers up to date on the topic of examinations. In the course of his talk, he gave the teachers useful information concerning the setting and correcting of provincial and APEB examinations.

The core of the afternoon program was a dynamic and informative talk by Mrs. Frank Ross, chairman of the Provincial Centennial Committee. An all-inclusive outline of the plans for the period from January to June 1967 was given as a challenging program set before the teachers.

Mrs. Ross stressed that the projects from Grades I to XII need not be superimposed on already busy schedules, but that these could be integrated into the school program.

After her talk Mrs. Ross asked the teachers to discuss the manner in which the Centennial program could be implemented in elementary and high school situations.

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Federal Service Division Top United Fund Quota

A meeting of the United Fund Federal Service Division committee was held in the fund office late Thursday afternoon to determine how to raise an additional \$72,066, the amount required to put this division "over the top". However, S.L. R. A. Dolron at CFB, Summerside, reported an additional amount of \$127 had been collected from the servicemen on the base and this brought the total from the Federal Service Division to \$24,102.94. This is 100 per cent of their quota and a record amount for this division.

This is the first time that the Federal Government Employees have exceeded their quota in their own division since the fund started on P.E.I. in 1962. Most of this amount is being contributed through payroll deductions which are spread over the full twelve month period for the first time this year.
