Moncton Beavers Win 13-2 From Abbies For N.B.-P.E.I. Juvenile Title

A fast, slick passing band of Moncton East End Beavers captured the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Juvenile hockey championship here at the Charlottetown Forum last night when they swamped the Abbotsford Abbeys by the lopsided count of 13-2 in a sudden death encounter for the title. The Beavers will now meet the Halifax Saint Mary's Juveniles for the Maritime Juvenile crown later this week.

Displaying smooth-passing attacks, the visiting Beavers jumped to the attack right from the opening whistle and disorganized the Abbie pucksters to fire home seven goals without a reply. Continuing the pressure in the second frame they slammed home four to run their count to 11-0 by the end of the frame. Playing their best hockey in the closing session, the Abbies shot the visitors two for two, and although they held their share of the play in that period, they were far too late in starting their comeback against the aggressive young Monctonian pucksters.

Ron Melanson was the big sharpshooter for the Beavers to come up with a stellar performance to rack up four goals, while Eddie Belliveau and Norman Crossman ran him a close second for scoring honors with three goals each. Other snipers for Moncton were Armond Dolron with a brace and Emery LeBlanc with a single tally.

Goal-tenders for Abbies were Malcolm McFadyen and Bob Hurry with one each while defenceman Stirling MacLure assisted on each tally with Willie Dunn also assisting on the second counter.

Polished passing and smart play around the net, combined with plenty of speed were the main factors in favor of the winning Moncton boys, who also came up with very close defensive play when Abbies were on the attack.

Boston Bruins Confident On Eve of Playoffs

BOSTON, March 27 (AP)—Although they have beaten Toronto Maple Leafs only twice in regular season play, Boston Bruins have no inferiority complex as they prepare to leave for Toronto today for the National Hockey League's Stanley Cup playoffs.

The Bruins will oppose the Leafs in Toronto Wednesday and Saturday and return here for games Sunday and Tuesday in one semi-final bracket. Montreal and Detroit are matched in the other half of the semi-finals.

"I feel right now that the team is at its peak performance," said Boston coach Lynn Patrick after a practice session today.

"We have a great chance. Breaks may decide it."

Patrick made a similar remark a year ago when he manoeuvred a fourth-place New York Ranger team into the finals and fought Detroit to the wire before losing to the Red Wings.

To strengthen their defence corps the Bruins today recalled Steve Kraftcheck from Indianapolis of the American League.

Murray Henderson, a Boston rear-guard stalwart, is out with a cracked rib and probably won't play until next Sunday.

The Bruins have added the names of eight farmhands to the cup play eligibility list. Four playing with Hershey in the American League playoffs are centre George (Red) Sullivan, right-wing Norm Corcoran, left-wing Jack McIntyre and forward Sam Bettio.

Four now with Tulsa in the United States Hockey League playoffs are forwards Barton Bradley and Eiland O'Brien, defenceman Bill Davidson and goalie Gordon Henry.

The Bruins also have engaged Harvey Bennett as their spare goalie for the series.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

Master Shortstop has arrived in Summerside! He didn't bring any luggage, he's not too enthusiastic about the town as yet, but we think he'll stay. You'll be seeing him between second and third base if you happen to be in Summerside in, say 1966. He's not even a paperweight yet, (7 pounds, 5 ounces) but Henry Michael will learn fast with Papa Hank to tell him all about the fundamentals.

The first baseman of the Maritime intermediate champs is also the proud papa of a bouncing baby boy. Congratulations, Jimmie O'Grady and Hank Landry. And carry on. We've certainly got to start worrying now about who are going to make up the infield of the Summerside baseball champs of 1970.

The chances of getting an Island hockey championship in Summerside now rest with Lippy Gaudet and his bantams. All other divisions have been eliminated. The Crystals won the East Prince League but were put out by East Royalty in the Island finals. The juniors got by Kensington (that's more than most Prince County motorists can do), but bowed to the Charlottetown Abegweits. There were no juveniles. The midgets trounced Alberton but weren't good enough to take the Charlottetown Abegweits. The Pee-wees were beaten in their first start by Kensington, the paperweights lost in the semi-finals to West Kent, the St. Mary's Convent girls put up a real tussle against Georgetown but lost 1 to 0. That's the story of defeat, and there is only Lippy Gaudet and his high-flying bantams between Summerside and complete annihilation. Charge, Lippy, charge! Oh, bantams, oh! Summerside hasn't failed to win an Island hockey championship in a good many years. It's up to you to see that the string is not broken.

The Kensington Pee-wees are still in the running for Island honors and Prince County will be pulling for them to win the fourth Island title for the county. The other three are: Ladies—Elmsdale; Intermediate—"B"—O'Leary; Intermediate—"C"—Lennox Island.

Right now it looks extremely doubtful that the old Crystal Rink will operate another year. Each fall the cost of repairs turns out to be a crippling bill which makes it hard for the proprietors to make a profit on the year's operations. Each year the destruction of juvenile vandals gets worse and worse, and the word this spring is that the destruction is so extensive that it will make the cost of repairing next year definitely prohibitive.

The trend of mild winters and frequent thaws is another factor that makes the operation of a natural ice rink rather risky, especially during the roof of it if it is at all heavy. It will be difficult to get anyone to take a chance on running the old wreck another year. That means that Summerside will be without an indoor skating rink for the first time in a good many years. We have no idea how long it's been since Summerside had no indoor rink, but some of the oldest citizens should be able to tell us.

Last year we were offered a hangar free of charge if we would pay the cost of dismantling and bringing it from Mount Pleasant to Summerside. That cost would have been considerable, but it must be admitted the offer was a generous one and one that would have saved us a good many shekels. Discretion is doubtless the better part of valor, but a willingness to plunge a little and take a few chances seems to be the "better part of business. Our over-cautious policy in refusing this offer that would have saved us a lot of money may be something we shall be very sorry for in years to come. Community rinks are going up in many Canadian towns and our chances of interesting anyone to build a private structure is pretty slim. There are two adjectives frequently applied to the town since Summerside that do not seem to be suited to each other at all. They are "richest" and "runklesk". Sounds a bit scroogey, if you ask me.
