Rev. J. M. Sproule Inducted As Alberton Church Minister

The induction of Rev. J. M. Sproule as minister of the United Pastoral Charge of the United Church of Canada took place in Alberton Thursday evening. Representing the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island were Rev. Norman Green of Elmsdale who conducted worship and inducted the minister. Rev. Blair MacPhail of Wellington who led in prayer and Rev. Cecil Webber of Summerside who read the scripture and preached the sermon. Mr. Webber reminded his hearers that the Christian Church is a fellowship of those who are co-workers with God for His kingdom in giving the charge to the people. He stated that a minister is trained by study and experience to lead, direct and inspire. The congregation must share responsibility for the on-going witness of the church in the community. Then followed the solemn and impressive pledges of the induction service. At the conclusion of the service Rev. Mr. Sproule and his wife were introduced to members of the congregation by Mr. Henry Clarke, a member of the session.

Let's Talk It Over

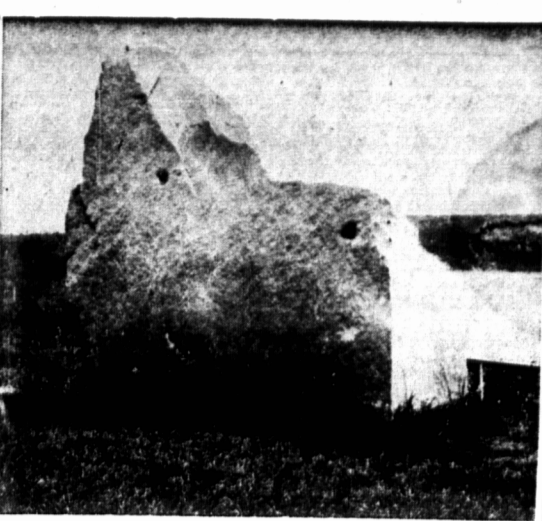

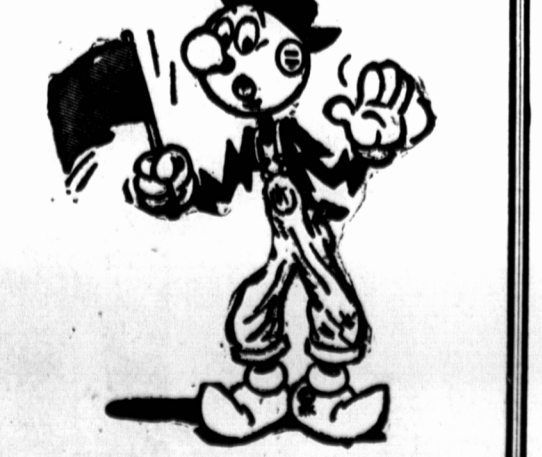

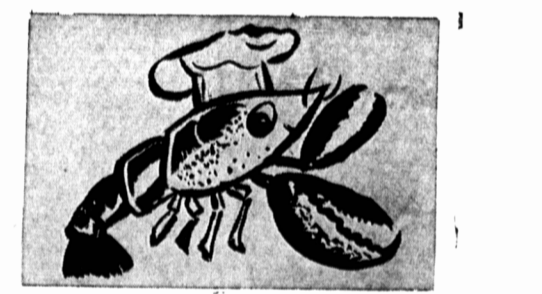
