**Working Wives Should Be Helped With Housework**

Dear Mary Haworth: In refusing R.W.'s barrage at modern housewives for foisting housework on the husband, I would like to state that a man feels no less masculine for helping with household chores. And the woman feels no less feminine for helping finance the household as necessary.

None of us completely male or female. We are mixtures, in different proportions, of the two potentials. Gender is determined chiefly by the psyche and the endocrine system. The husband who does housework, or the wife who does wage earning, in support of their partnership, is no less male or female, intrinsically, because of that. They are doing what comes naturally, because they don't feel bound by the social inhibitions of an obsolete post.

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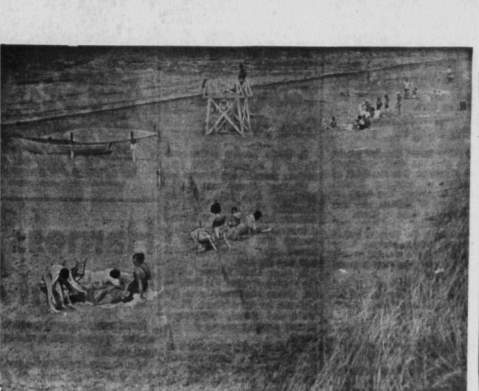
