

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LIVERPOOL, June 10.

An attempt was made last night to blow up the Town Hall in this city, but it only resulted in breaking the windows of the Hall, and in Brown's buildings on the opposite side of the street. It is reported two men were arrested with dynamite and loaded revolvers in their possession.

Steamer Ranzani, from Little Bay, Newfoundland, for Swansea, which encountered an ice pack and stove her bow and put into Betts' Cove for repairs has arrived here.

LONDON, June 10.

A policeman was arrested at Mullingar, County Westmeath, for refusing to form part of an escort to some Land League prisoners. He threw down his rifle and helmet and declared he would not go a step farther.

Archbishop Croke, in his address at Tipperary, said it was the duty of the Irish party to pass the Land Bill, insisting only on such amendments as relate to arrears of rent and the constitution of the rent courts. He advised the people to avoid all assemblages at evictions, sales, etc.

The News believes Gladstone will shortly submit to the Commons the necessity of going on with the Land Bill day by day.

The Times says Secretary Forster has been completing arrangements for appointments on the Land Commission.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

PARIS, June 10.

The immediate consequence of the Senate's vote on the Scrutin de Liste bill is that a new election bill cannot be introduced before the coming elections, which therefore, will be held under the present system.

TUNIS, June 10.

The Franco-Tunisian treaty has been ratified. M. Roustan, French Minister, informed the foreign representatives here that the Bay, by special decree, appointed him sole intermediary for the transaction of business with them.

NEW YORK, June 11.

The Star editorially states that it has special information from Ireland that a great crisis is imminent there. It says in spite of every effort of the British Government, which has made the possession of an old musket a crime, people are armed and ready to use their weapons. Skirmishes are about to exchange stones, scythes and shillelahs for revolvers and repeating rifles which have been obtained through secret agencies in France, Germany and America. Ireland is about to seal her protest against England with her blood and to sacrifice valuable lives to arouse the whole civilized world to her terrible wrongs.

CORK, June 10.

Of 43 rioters charged with taking part in last night's disturbance, 23 have been sentenced to imprisonment. The others were liberated on their own recognizances. The city is now quiet. The Mitchellstown magistrate to day solemnly warned the people from the bench that if the riots were renewed troops would be under military control, and any assemblage would be treated as an act of warfare.

LONDON, June 11.

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent at Chester reports that the police have received a communication from the Government, stating that Fenians in America have detailed a number of men to destroy buildings in various cities of the United Kingdom, including Chester.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, June 10.

Chauncey M. Dewey makes the following statement: I brought no money to Albany; I have asked for no man's vote; I have paid for no man's vote, nor have I authorized any person to do so for me. I earnestly hope that the matter will be probed to the bottom, and that a conclusion will be reached as soon as possible.

PITTSBURG, June 10.

Floods at Oil City washed houses out of place. The losses of lumber on the Alleghany aggregate \$15,000.

ABILENE, Kansas, June 10.

A storm struck the Solomon Valley last evening, at Belvoir. At Solomon City a number of houses were destroyed, but no lives were lost. Four miles north west of here, Dennis Morgan and wife were instantly killed. Their house was totally destroyed. At Barrington a farmer named Frothingham, his wife and hired hand were killed. The house was completely demolished.

WEST INDIES.

HAVANA, June 10.

The Spanish steamer Alicante, wrecked near Girona, is a total loss. All on board were saved, including a battalion of Chasseurs de Bata.

Advices from Santa Domingo to May 29th are to the effect that President Merino had finally accepted the Dictatorship which had been proclaimed throughout the Republic. The Dictator had liberated all the political prisoners.
