Red Cross Reports Encouraging Progress

Lt. Col. L. F. Macdonald presided at the well attended regular monthly meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Executive held at Red Cross Headquarters yesterday afternoon. The receipts of \$4,500.00 from the Rotary Club of Charlottetown as proceeds from last week's Radio Auction and the Auction conducted by the Masons of Montague was highlighted in the report given by the chairman of the Crippled Children's Committee, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan. This money will be used to help finance treatment for needy handicapped children in this province during 1954.

A very satisfactory progress report of the organization of Disaster Services was given by Mr. Gordon MacDonald who is meeting with good results in setting up Committees in several centres throughout the province.

Brigadier W. W. Reid, chairman of the Campaign Committee, told the meeting that progress is being made in bringing the 1953 campaign up to its provincial objective.

The Blood Donor Committee whose chairman is Mr. F. A. Large, expressed satisfaction with the result of last week's Blood Donor Clinic at which the province's objective of 1,000 was exceeded by some 136.

Dr. A. J. Murchison, chairman of the First Aid Committee, reported that there are now 17 First Aid Classes in progress with an enrolment of 355 persons, and that plans are underway for an Instructors' School to be held during the Christmas holidays.

The chairman of the Swimming and Water Safety Committee, Rev. M. D. Dunbar, told the meeting that while his Committee's summer programme had been brought to a successful conclusion, steps are now being taken to carry out education in Ice Safety during the winter months.

Loading Potatoes For Venezuela

One of the most beautiful ships to come into this port, is the 1,500 ton "Clindra" of German registry, built last year in Bremen. Its sleek lines and overall modern appearance immediately brings to mind something from the pages of "Flash Gordon". Probably the thing which attracts the most attention is the absence of masts and booms which appear as a regular part of ships. In their place are three electrically operated cranes which swing in the same manner as that of a gun turret. The whole operation of loading and unloading the cargo is carried out with an almost complete absence of noise. The interior of the ship, which is

spotlessly clean, presents a view of complete ultra modern styling and offers accommodation which could never be expected on a freighter. The Clindra, under command of Captain Hess, is taking on a part cargo of 8,000 bags of potatoes for Venezuela. She had previously taken on the most of her load in the Great Lakes' ports. Captain Hess during World War II served with the German Merchant Navy and was captured in 1939 near the Dutch East Indies. After spending some time in a prison camp in Sumatra, he was brought to Canada and spent the remainder of his time in an Ontario camp. The Captain likes Canada; he spent a good deal of his time working with farmers during the time of his imprisonment here.

OTTAWA, (CP) - Agriculture Minister Gardiner, now in Rome, has accepted an invitation to spend a week in Israel, his office said Thursday. He will tour the country to see some of Israel's agricultural developments and historical sites.
