

Top Crowd Of Week At Last Night's Races

Alberton Colt Winner Of 3-year-old Trot, Pace In Afternoon Program

Thrills, excitement and the first dead heat of Old Home Week were handed to racing fans yesterday afternoon as four great classes were raced before the largest crowd of the week to date.

An Island colt, Just Rita, owned by Mr. James O'Brien, Alberton won the annual three-year-old trot and pace from a field of six other fast stepping youngsters. His driver was presented with a silver tray by Commander G. H. Buntain on behalf of the Exhibition Association.

The Island-bred colt was driven by George Sobey and left no doubt of its speed as it came on fast in the stretch to take the first heat with five horses driving to the wire. She did it again in the second heat as she came roaring down the stretch to barely nose out Commander Bill who had led all the way.

The Fourth Division of the 2.21 pace had three heat winners as Miss Commando, Bessie Budlong and Lily Marlene were all credited with wins. In the opening heat, Trixie Scott had been in the lead from the quarter pole and turned on the heat in the stretch to come under the wire in front. However, the judges ruled there had been interference on the first turn and set her back to sixth. Miss Commando was named the winner.

Bessie Budlong took an early lead in the second heat and held on to beat out Miss Playfair and Texas Girl in the fight to the wire. The third heat provided the best and

most exciting finish of the afternoon. Lily Marlene went to the front fast but right with her to the three quarter mark were all the rest. They hit the top turn in a bunch and then poured it on in the bitter stretch drive. Lily held on to her slim lead, Bessie Budlong and Gallant Bobby finished in a dead heat for sixth position. Bud Kalmuck had too much speed and could turn it on when needed as he copped the classified trot in three straight heats. In the first heat there was a four-horse battle in the stretch with Bud slipping under the wire to nose out Brooke of Athlone. The Sydney horse took an early lead in the second and kept it when Milldale, piloted by Willard Kelly, could not get to him at the finish. In the final heat the Kalmuck horse took over the lead from Norman Frisco at the top turn and easily stayed off the closing rushes of the rest of the field. Throughout the entire race there was a great deal of breaking with three and sometimes four horses being on the run together.

The Third Division of the 2.18 Pace brought the fastest time of the day as Silk Hal came flying home in the first heat in 2:13 3-5. Piloted by James McGregor, the Bevan-owned pacer also took the third heat.

In the opener Dale B. and Lucky Number had been battling for the lead and they turned on a wild stretch drive for the wire. However, Silk Hal had been coming fast from the three-quarter mark and with speed to burn just nipped Lucky Number at the wire. Once again Dale B. took the lead in the second heat and held on despite pressure from Mannister Direct and Silk Hal. Lucky Number jumped it off on the first turn and was never in it.

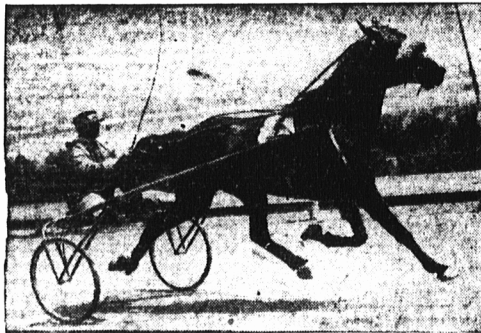
In the final heat of the afternoon driver Joe Hennessy snapped the rail at the start with Lucky Number. Dale B. took over at the quarter but when they hit the paddock turn the second time round it was Lucky Number on top again. But once more it was Silk Hal moving like a bullet in the stretch to provide a wild drive.

What Island Marksmen Did At Rifle Meet

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 13.—(Special)—The Prince Edward Island Regiment team placed third in the Borden team match at the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association annual shoot here Tuesday. A trio team of six missed the Steinhart trophy by one point. Trp. Walter Gamble placed 7th in the City of Ottawa Match with 298 out of a total of 300 points. Cpl. A. M. Johnston leads the Island team with 288, followed by Major G. A. MacDonald and Lt. R. E. Jenkins with 286. Mary MacLennan with 285, A. G. Gormley, Sgt. Eric Coles, Sgt. G. MacLennan with 284 and Capt. Roy McCabe with 282.

Expects Playoff With Quebec Major League Winners

HALIFAX, Aug. 13.—(CP)—As far as the president of the Maritime Major Hockey League knows there will be a playoff with the winners of the Quebec League again this season.

Judge J. E. Hudson, head of the Maritime league, said that if the Quebec league has changed its stand, he hasn't been informed. "At a conference last May," he said, "the Q.S.H.L. was asked point-blank if it would play off with the Maritime winner for the Alexander Trophy. The answer was 'Yes.' They qualified that, however by saying that they would engage in Alexander Trophy competition only if the Maritime League played major hockey."

"When a C.A.H.A. official asked them why they didn't turn pro if they were so anxious to play off with the Western Hockey League they said they had no intention of turning pro but preferred to play the Maritime winners."

Veteran Marksman Wins Queen's Gold Medal Match At DCRA Meet

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Aug. 13.—(CP)—A veteran Bisleys marksman today won the Queen's gold medal match at the 84th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

Lt.-Col. Steve Johnson of Calgary, a shooting member of Canada's Bisleys team four times and who qualified for this year's team, posted a score of 178 of a possible 200.

Sgt. Jack MacNeil, of Vancouver finished second with 177 and Capt. J. R. Newell of Winnipeg third with 175.

Pte. Roy Walker of New Westminster, B.C., also posted a 175 but was given fourth placing because of his poorer placements on the target. S. Sgt. G. B. Kay of Hamilton, and Pte. Sgt. J. V. Martin of Camp Borden, Ont., tied for fifth spot with 174.

The match, open to members of the armed forces, is deliberate firing from 600 yards; firing with movement at 600 to 100 yards; rapid firing at 300 yards and snap shooting from 300 yards.

The match was won for the last three years by Lieut. Gilmour S. Boa of Toronto, who is not competing this year.

Lieut. Boa was a shooting member of this year's Bisleys team and later went to Helsinki to represent Canada at the Olympics. Earlier a member of the British rifle team captured the Macdougall Challenge Cup in a thrilling shoot-off.

Lieut. Wheeler of London matched his bull's-eyes with Sgt. W. E. Hicks of Edmonton in the regulation five-round shoot-off and had to go into a shot-for-shot competition to decide the winner.

In the match proper, which was fired Monday from 200 and 500 yards, Wheeler and Hicks tied with three other marksmen with possible scores of 100.

Loses Shoot-Off

The other three — Maj. A. F. Gormley, Charlottetown; Capt. J. C. Kirk, Listowel, Ont., and Pte. Lt. G. T. Giles of Ottawa — fell by the wayside in the regulation shoot-off.

Wheeler and Hicks scored a perfect 25 but the shot-for-shot ended suddenly when Wheeler pumped in a bull on his first and Hicks fell to an inner four.

Gormley finished the shoot-off with Kirk for second with a score of 24 of a possible 25, and Giles placed last with a 23.

It was the first match of the week that shot-for-shot competition was necessary to break a tie. It also was the first match in which a member of the British team placed first.

A four-man R.C.M.P. "A" team from Ottawa won the City of Ottawa Cup for posting the highest team score in the Ottawa match. The team carded a score of 384 of a possible 400 from 200 and 900 yards. Tactical "A" group R.C.A.F. of Edmonton was second with 378.

The winning team and individual scores: Sgt. C. C. Wilson 97; Commissioner A. H. Nicholson 94; Cpl. W. D. Johnson 97, and Sgt. E. C. Armstrong 97.

The Winnipeg Light Infantry won the team challenge cup for posting the highest score in the Coates Match. The four-man team carded a score of 385 of a possible 400, firing 10 rounds at 500 and 600 yards.

A four-man Royal Canadian Navy team from Halifax finished the match with a similar score but was given second placing because

Ohio Hal, pacing fast in the stretch, won the first heat of the Classified Pace, a Junior free for all, last night to rack up the fast time of 2:11 3-5 as Old Home Week hit the half-way mark.

The biggest crowd of the week was on hand to swell the numbers of those who had been there in the afternoon and made it one of the biggest Wednesdays on record.

The featured pace was a honey of a race in both its heats. In the first Gay Law got away on top but the lead changed to Follow Up Junior. When they hit the homestretch it was Gay Law, Seven Up Direct and Ohio Hal in a pacing duel that had the fans yelling till it was over before the latter nosed under first in the fast time of 2:11 3-5.

The second heat gave the fans an upset as Jo Jo Spencer snapped the rail at the start and made every post a winning one and come home four lengths to the good.

In the opening event 11 starters turned in behind the gate to get the word. Calumetta led from the start until the back stretch when Rusty Miller briefly took over. But he could not hold the fast moving Calumetta and she turned for home in the lead again and held it to win by a length as Penny Royal came on with a burst of speed to get the place.

In the second heat Rusty Miller and Calumetta staged another battle with Rusty leading 'into the stretch only to see Belvin Budlong come blazing home to beat both of them as Calumetta faded and Sister Verna got second place. It was a tonic for the Charlottetown horse as she came storming down the stretch the final heat in a four horse battle with Belvin Budlong America's Bud and Penny Royal in one of the most thrilling finishes of the night. World's Pacing Record Tied By Hit Song

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 13.—(AP)—A world's pacing record was tied and Hit Song, second to Sharp Note in the Hambletonian last week, avenged that defeat in the review three-year-old trot to headline Grand Circuit races at the Illinois State Fair today.

Sampson Hanover, taking the first heat of the Ann Rutledge 14 class pace in 1:57 4/5, equalled the world's race record, made last year at Lexington by Good Time.

Frank Ervin, who drove Good Time to the mark, was behind Sampson today as the handsomest brown horse owned by K. D. Owen of Houston, Tex., beat Guinea Gold and Red Sails in a blanket finish.

Guinea Gold, owned and driven by Pearl Hungerford, and Red Sails, with Roy Riegle driving, were clocked in 1:59 4/5.

First heat of the review trot was almost an exact duplicate of the Hambletonian, until Hit Song edged home in front. Sharp Note was second and Duke of Lullwater third. On the second trip the Duke broke stride and finished fifth with Sharp Note again trailing Hit Song which is owned by the Arden Homestead of Goshen, N.Y., and was driven by Harry Pownall. He Shively, 75 year old reinsman, again drove Sharp Note. Ten horses started, nine of them Hambletonian racers last week.
