ST. DUNSTAN'S COLLEGE

Those who are particularly interested in St. Dunstan's College are to be congratulated upon the growth of the institution in recent years. An increasing number of students has necessitated an enlarged college building; and the advisability of still another wing is now being discussed. Students come not alone from the Roman Catholic communities of Prince Edward Island,—they come to St. Dunstan's from Quebec and other parts of the great North American continent. Prince Edward Island is unique, and affords, in itself, attractions for the student. Its climate is invigorating to mind and body, and it affords the retirement and quiet—unattainable in large cities—which are essential to the higher intellectual development. That well-informed parents should select well-ordered educational institutions in Prince Edward Island is therefore not wonderful. But it is creditable to those who govern the institution, to the Rector and his efficient staff, that so many parents in Quebec and elsewhere have selected St. Dunstan's as the *Alma Mater* of their boys. From the merely commercial point of view, it is important that the trend of students should be towards this Province. Each boy at college here, expends hundreds of dollars a year in the community. From this point of view, everyone must hope that the ambition of St. Dunstan's to take on another wing will be long realized. But for Roman Catholics the institution is, of course, a higher good. Judging by the tone of the commencement exercises, we have no hesitation in saying that this higher good is being attained. The papers read and the addresses delivered were thoughtful, logical, well composed, and breathed a wholesome spirit; and there was in evidence also, the pure intellectual pleasure afforded by good music, vocal and instrumental.

**MISLEADING**

It is pointed out that the analysis of the political "group" of British Columbia, as published in the *Star*, is misleading. A correspondent of the *Star* says that the giving of seventeen Opposition members in addition to the Conservatives is simply a blind. Out of the seventeen men, so classified, all but one, the *Star* correspondent, learns are Conservatives, who have, thus, a clear majority over all the others. It is added that little doubt is entertained that the whole of the successful candidates, except Martin's immediate supporters, will vote together against the Premier, and it is noted, as remarkable that, with the exception of Martin and his immediate supporters, there was not a Liberal among the candidates.

The Vancouver World, before the elections, gave a list of the Martin Government candidates throughout the province to show that it is purely a Liberal Government, and should be supported by all Liberals. In the particularization it describes some of the candidates as "well known Liberals," others as having "nothing in their veins but the best of Liberal blood." Another is "descended from Highland Scotch Liberals," still another "has been noted as an advanced Liberal," others are simply "staunch Liberals" while one is the "President of the Vancouver Liberal Ass-

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sociation." This goodly array of Liberals has, as the *Moncton Times* remarks, been practically wiped out.

**THE POLITICIANS AND THE PRESS.**

In the course of his fine address of yesterday afternoon, Dr. Campbell made a decided hit at the Politicians and the Press. But he seemed to forget that these are, upon the whole, what the people make them. If the politicians break their promises and are corrupt or incapable, the people have the power to "vote them down" and "turn them out," and newspapers which publish sensations and lies would not last long if not patronized by the people. When blaming the politicians and the press of their country, the people reflect upon themselves. It's the people's business to select and elect capable and honest politicians; it's the people's business to discriminate between newspapers which habitually publish falsehoods and misrepresentations and those which publish the truth.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

—The Kaiser, imperious as he is, hasn't his own sweet will in respect to everything. He recently expressed a wish that the English language should be effectually taught in the gymnasium of the National Schools. But the delegates to the German School Reform Association decided that English shall be optional, like Hebrew.

—The fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Fielding and one or two other ministers kept their seats while the National Anthem was being sung in the House of Commons, a few days ago is being much commented upon by the press. "Actions," it is said, "speak louder than words." Sir Louis Davies stood up like a British man and so did Sir Henri Joly de Lotbiniere.

—Whether the Federal Government will act with promptitude or not, in respect to the demand for the dismissal of Lieutenant-Governor McInnes, is being watched with great interest. The general consensus of opinion amongst constitutional lawyers is that they have no choice but to take immediate action and dismiss him.

—Commenting upon the report that Mr. Tarte threatened to close up the Canadian section of the Paris exhibition unless he was given the chief place in the reception to President Loubet, the *Montreal Gazette* says that "in a few months the Canadian people will have an opportunity to cut off the very big head of a very small minister. They will do credit to their country by taking advantage of it."

—One of the papers courtesies Sir Wilfrid Laurier's deception in respect to the plebiscite and prohibition, and other matters, with the straightforward act of Hugh John McDonald in passing the prohibition bill to which he stood pledged to the electors of Manitoba, and remarks: "Between the manly Hugh John and the tricky Sir Wilfrid there is a vast difference of moral character."

**IS IT PROHIBITION OR A SHAM?**

Sir,—The Pineau Government has passed a Prohibition law, and an attempt is made to give them credit for what is only Prohibition in name. Agrippa said to Paul, "thou hast almost persuaded me to be a Christian." This last act is almost prohibition, but it is prohibition only in name; for it does not touch the innumerable and more dangerous clubs which will, the moment it is declared law, spring into existence. The temperance organizations, the churches and lovers of good order and sobriety should not be deceived. It is not a prohibitory law,—but almost a prohibitory law. Hence the Farquarson-Pineau Government are not entitled to any credit as they have passed this "almost" law, knowing that it cannot be enforced by themselves.

The Opposition supported this law, but wanted the provisions to be made more stringent, and include every organization and club, now or hereafter existing, to come under its provisions. The Pineau Government voted against the prohibitory amendment, and supported the "almost" Prohibition Law now passed. It is a sop which gives poor comfort to the temperance people; for it will remain a dead letter upon the statute book. The country should at once awaken up to a full realization that this Government, which is a mixture of License and quasi-prohibition, is only a sham and fraud upon the intelligence of a people who should insist on responsible government in this province, and not a one-man power (Pineau) as we have now.
