MEAT MEASUREMENTS: recipes for 6
CANDYMAKER'S MAINE COAST COOKING:
2 lbs. yellow perch filets or other fish fillets, fresh or frozen 1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
2 c. bread stuffing (herb seasoned)
1/2 c. oil or melted fat
3 slices bacon (optional)
Thaw fillets if frozen. Skn in fillets if necessary. Sprinkle both sides with salt and pepper. Line 12-compartment well-lidded muffin pan with fillets, overlapping ends.
Fill center of each with bread stuffing. Brush tops with fat; place 1/2 slice bacon on each.
Bake in mod. oven, 350 degrees F., for 25 to 30 min. until fish flakes easily when tested with fork.

MAINE DOUGHNUTS FOR BREAKFAST
4 c. sifted flour
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg
1 large egg
1/2 c. vegetable oil
1 c. milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
Vegetable oil for deep-frying
Sift together dry ingredients.
Beat egg; add oil, egg, milk and vanilla. Pour slowly into dry mixture and work with fork to light dough. Let stand 15 min.
Transfer to flour surface. Roll 1/2 inch thick. Cut with doughnut cutter.
Slide into deep vegetable oil when dough to brown cube of bread 1 1/2 min. at 350 degrees F. When doughnuts rise to surface, turn gently with fork so browned side will be even.
Cook about 3 min. Drain on crumpled paper towels.
Dust with confectioners' sugar if desired. Makes about 3 dozen.

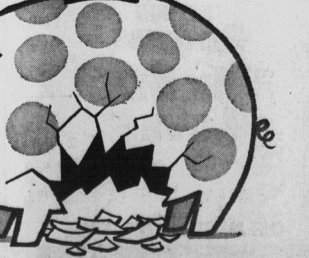
MR. AND MRS. JERRY GAUDET Nuptial Mass Celebrated At Sacred Heart Church
