100th Anniversary Services Held

Services of thanksgiving and dedication were held yesterday throughout the Anglican Diocese of Nova Scotia, with jurisdiction over Prince Edward Island, marking the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the Synod.

Throughout the Diocese of P. E. Island an exchange of clergy took place which brought Rural Dean, Rev. J. R. MacMahon Rector of Alberton to the morning services at St. Paul's Church Charlottetown and Ven. Rev. G. R. Harrison, Archdeacon of P. E. Island, and Rector of Summerside to preach at the evening service at St. Peter's Cathedral the services were taken by the same ministers in reverse order.

The commemoration, which will continue through a two year period will recall, meeting summoned by Bishop Binney, 1854, constitution adopted 1855 and first session of Diocesan Synod held 1856.

Other memorable events in the history of the Diocese are: The First Anglican Service of Worship in Nova Scotia at Annapolis Royal 1749 St. Paul's Parish, Halifax, the first Anglican Church in Canada and in 1753 St. John's, Lunenburg, N. S. the second. The University of King's College, Windsor, N. S. was established in 1789. Recalling events leading to the establishment of the Anglican Church here, it is noted that Rev. Theophilus DesBrisay was appointed Minister of the Parish of Charlotte by Royal warrant dated Sept. 21, 1774 on Nov. 23, 1775 he was in the Gut of Canso, a passenger on a vessel that was conveying John Russell Spence, a member of the Council for the Island of John to Charlottetown.

The first entry in the parish records is dated 1777, and the parish of Charlotte was regularly constituted by local statute in 1781. On Sunday, May 17, 1789, H. M. S. Dido arrived from Halifax having on board Right Rev. Charles Inglis, D.D. Bishop of Nova Scotia. This was the first Episcopal visit the Island was favoured with.

The work of erecting St. Paul's Church was commenced on April 23, 1800.

Sydney Teenagers Noteworthy Career of Former Islander

The following details of the career of Mr. John J. McGowan, a native of Charlottetown who died recently at Elizabeth, New Jersey, are from his obituary appearing in the Newark Evening News:

Mr. McGowan was treasurer of the State Democratic Committee, and a partner in the Elizabeth printing firm of Colby & McGowan. His death at 76 ends one of the more colorful careers in Elizabeth politics in which he was active for many years.

Born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Mr. McGowan was graduated from Laval University, Quebec, where he qualified for a Rhodes Scholarship but turned it down. He also attended St. Dunstan's College in Charlottetown and Fordham University Law School.

Turning to a newspaper career, Mr. McGowan joined the old New York Sun in the 1900's, worked for the old Plainfield Daily Press and the Elizabeth Daily Journal, helped found the now defunct Elizabeth Times of which he was editor and publisher; was a political and financial writer for the Newark News and managing editor of the old Newark Morning Ledger.

He served as press representative for former President Woodrow Wilson. Mr. McGowan was first elected Democratic state committeeman from Union County in 1928 and served until 1930. He again was elected in 1938 and served until his death. He was one of the guiding hands behind the election for seven terms of former Mayor James T. Kirk, whom LaCorte defeated in 1932. McGowan was popularly reported to have written most of Kirk's campaign material during his long service as mayor.
