Paced by the starry playing of

Alberton Regals trimmed the
Summerside Mercurys 11-6 in the
fifth game of the Intermediate
semi-finals in the O'Leary Rink
last night to win the two game
series fifteen goals to nine.

In the first period the capacity
crowd saw the Alberton team out-
skate, outplay and outshoot the
Summerside boys to score six
goals without a reply, five of them
being banged in the net in a
hectic four minutes and three
seconds. In the opener Glen Mat-
thews scored four and assisted on
a fifth with Atkinson and M.

In the middle stanza it was
Matthews again notching up the
only goal of the period. In the last
half of the final session the Mer-
curys put on a blazing rally to
score six goals to the Regals four
with Mooney Gallant getting three.

Two great little teams are
battling it out this year for the
Prince Edward Island Juvenile
Hockey Championship. One of
the bitterest contests for supremacy
we have ever seen in Island
sport was waged on Bedeque Ice
Wednesday night with Gordie
Kelly's Sheen & McInnis boys
coming out on top after eleven
minutes of overtime play.

In the early stages of the game,
it looked as if the Summerside
squad was not quite going to
measure up to the brilliant puck
pushers from the Capital City,
but after Walker's three-goal
spurt in 14 seconds, the team
caught fire, and battled fiercely
right down to the dramatic mo-
ment when Grady slipped the
pay-off pass to MacDonald whose
sudden-death goal sent the teams
back to their dressing rooms at
1:15 o'clock in the morning.

We'd like to give Gordie Kelly a
bouquet on the way he handles
this team. Gord is up against a
starry lot of Charlottetown play-
ers, and may, or may not come out
on top with his charges, but his
coaching technique is something
we'll subscribe to in any case. We
heard Kelly speak to his boys be-

at, giving praise where praise is due,

the tissue of soft-spoken words.

We've heard a good many
coaches give those in-between pe-
riod instructions to their players,
and the advice is so often the
same old "up-and-at-em" malarkey. Gordie really had a message
for his charges. His words cut
into the players' weaknesses like
a surgeon's scalpel and his "do
and don'ts" seemed particularly
fitted for those players and that
game. That was the impression
we got.

Before the overtime Wednesday
night, Gordie ended by saying:
"Let's go out and wrap this one up
for Dickie Noonan. (Dick is the
member of the team who was in-
jured seriously in a shooting ac-
cident a few weeks ago). Young
Noonan is mighty popular with
the boys and they were surely
pleased to "wrap it up for Dick."

The Juvenile Abbies under Art
Perry are a smart aggregation.
Forbie Kennedy and Willie Dunn
shone the brightest on the for-
ward line, with MacFadyen, a
hard-bitten lad who always plays
for keeps, a close third. Billy
Purcell is a tower of strength
back of the blue-line.
