LORD ELCHINSTONE recently purchased a farm of 1,500 acres in Manitoba. It will be cultivated by his sons.

THE Customs receipts at Toronto for July were \$289,276.77; in July last they were \$181,101.78, showing an increase for this year of \$108,174.99.

THE ATLANTA.—The Times of Aug. 2, publishes a description of the figure-head of the Atlanta, widely differing from the description of the one picked up by the Girl of Devon, and published by the New York Herald.

THE farmers of the parish of St. Hubert, Quebec, have formed an association for the export of hay. Twenty farmers alone have undertaken to deliver 350,000 bundles, equal to 20,250 tons of best quality of hay. The association have sold ahead 7,500 tons.

CITY OF GLASGOW BANK.—Srenach and Porter, the former the manager and the latter a director of the City of Glasgow Bank, convicted of complicity with the great frauds of that institution, were released on the 31st ult., in good health after 18 months' imprisonment.

ON Tuesday last the residence of a well-known farmer at New Glasgow was besieged by a large swarm of active bees. THE Picnic of St. Patrick's T. A. & B. Society was held yesterday. The weather was very unfavorable, but notwithstanding this drawback a goodly number attended. The accommodation for dancing was excellent, and the other arrangements were carried out in a praiseworthy style by the efficient Committee. In the walking match, Hogan—the champion local pedestrian—was the victor, having covered five miles in the hour.

THE Halifax Chronicle tells of a stowaway by the steamer "Carroll" from Boston for Halifax, who was given in charge of the police of the latter city on Monday. The stowaway gave the name of Patrick Murray, and said he belonged to Charlottetown, P. E. Island. He got on board the "Carroll" at Boston. He had neither money nor ticket. The Moncton Times says: "Doubtless he went out with the title from the Island last spring, allured by the reckless and unpatriotic utterances of papers of the Patriot stamp, and now he is willing to run any risk in order to get back to his much abused home before the cold of winter drove him from Boston Common."

THE FAIRBAIRN FAMILY, Scottish Vocalists, are now giving a series of successful entertainments in Prince Co. They will arrive in this city and open in Market Hall on Monday night. The Transcript speaks as follows of a recent entertainment in Boston:—"No lover of song and story should fail to enjoy these unique entertainments. Mr. Fairbairn himself is a poet of no mean order, as a poem of his recently printed in these columns testifies; hence, his selections are made with judgment and good taste. His two daughters—bright and clever girls—assist in the musical illustrations, one of them being a good player as well as singer; and when all of the voices are joined in some stirring lyric, one is sure to feel that thrill which comes from hearing a genuine bit of music truly and sympathetically sung."

THE Athenaeum, which has been closed so long, is about to resume a new lease of life, as it has been leased for a new Academy of Music and is now in course of transformation. It is the intention to enlarge the stage, put in new and appropriate scenery and otherwise beautify the auditorium. For the special comfort of the audience, there will be good seating accommodation for six hundred people, laid out as follows: Orchestra Chairs, cushioned and folding, 200; Parquette, 200; Gallery, which will be enlarged and brought forward horse shoe shape, 250. In addition, it is the intention to put in four large boxes, each capable of containing six persons, and one of which will be specially adapted for state occasions. The alterations are being supervised by Harry Lindley, who arrived in this city yesterday. This is undoubtedly a move in the right direction, for the shortcomings of the Market Hall are so manifold that any alterations must be for the better, and it will, doubtless, be a source of gratification to our townsmen as well as strangers, to have a place of amusement in which the better class of performances can be produced with due effect. It is expected to be ready for opening August 22nd.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

The Times has advices from Candahar to August 2nd. On the morning of July 27th, Gen. Burrows engaged Ayoub Khan's force of 12,000 men and 20 guns, fifty miles beyond Candahar. After four hours' severe fighting, Burrows was repulsed and forced to retreat to Candahar. The British loss is 20 officers, 400 Europeans and 800 natives killed and missing, most of the loss occurring in retreat. Three horse artillery guns were abandoned. Preparations are being made for the siege in Candahar.

The foregoing news was brought in by a native messenger from Candahar, and telegraphed from Killa Abdulla, a post forty-four miles on the Candahar side of Quetta.

The Times says: "We may assume that messengers left Candahar on Saturday. We learn for the first time that Burrows was the assailant. As the Afghans do not take prisoners we fear all the missing may be reckoned killed. The upshot of the story is that out of 2,400 men, not more than half—some of whom were wounded—followed Burrows into Candahar."

The Telegraph urges that some officer should be sent to Afghanistan of sufficient rank and reputation to restore mutual confidence in the several camps and smother all individual jealousies.

A Bombay despatch to the Times, under date of Monday, says that news is expected from General Primrose, at Candahar, by native runners in about two days.

The Government at Bombay cannot spare any European troops for reinforcements.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

In the Commons this evening the Marquis of Hartington announced that the British Agent at Quetta telegraphs, Aug. 2, and that it is said that Ayoub Khan has marched to Mir Kabez, and detailed a force for an attack on Chaman Choke. In the Lords Earl Granville announced that Viceroy of India had telegraphed that a powerful force, comprising all arms of service under command of Gen. Roberts has been ordered to march to Candahar.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

The Scotsman's London correspondent believes that the Government is considering the advisability of appointing Sir Garnet Wolseley commander-in-chief in India.

A Simla despatch puts strength of Gen. Roberts' forces for relief of Candahar at 10,000 men.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

The Times says: "We cannot be wrong in assuming that the illness of Mr. Gladstone must occasion his withdrawal from the Commons during the rest of the session. His illness was brought on by assiduous attention to public business and constant attendance in the House, which told on his strength. Telegrams from many parts of the country state that the news of Mr. Gladstone's illness is received with general regret."

LONDON, Aug. 3.

The Standard says: "The apprehension that Gladstone is in a precarious state does not correctly give his situation. He is in a serious condition."

LONDON, Aug. 3.

A bulletin dated 11.40 o'clock to-night says Gladstone passed a quiet day. His fever is less and general condition satisfactory.

LONDON, Aug. 3.

In the Lords to-night the Compensation Bill was rejected, 282 to 51.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 3.

An identical note from the ambassadors demanding settlement of Montenegrin question has been presented to the Porte.

UNITED STATES.

ELPALO, COL., Aug. 3.

B. H. Grierson had three fights with Victoria's band of Indians, about 100 strong, who attempted to pass north into Texas on the 30th ult., between Fort Quitman and Eagle Springs. Lieut. Callada was wounded, one soldier and eight horses killed. On the approach of the troops the Indians fled.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.

Tanner had another attack of nausea to-night, but at midnight was sleeping well.

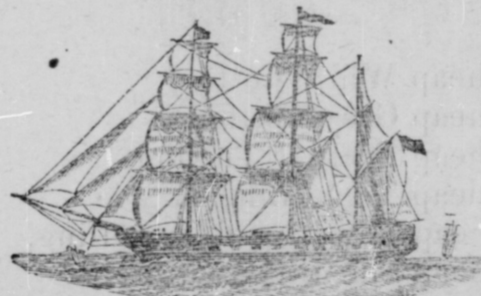

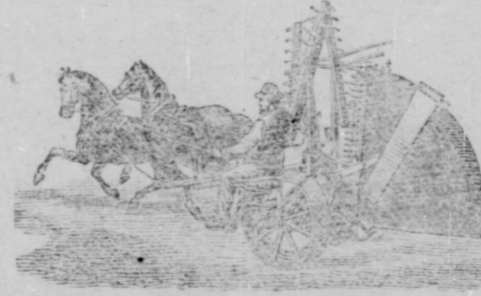
