10 pigs averaging 180 lbs., all B's at 25.40 value 475.20 dollars; 10 pigs averaging 165 lbs. at 28.00 value 462.00 dollars. If all graded A's with an additional premium, the latter lot would bring 482.00 dollars. It would take about 1000 lbs. of feed to put on this additional 150 lbs. at an approximate cost of 37.00 dollars.

If this extra feed cost were subtracted from the returns of the heavier lot it would reduce their net returns to 438.20 dollars to make the difference in net value between the two lots amount to 43.80 dollars or 4.38 dollars per hog.

Evacuation Plans For Target Areas

ARNPRIOR, Ont. (CP)—Practically all Canadian metropolitan target areas soon will be prepared to put evacuation plans into operation, provincial civil defence co-ordinators have been told.

The provincial officials Friday concluded their five-day annual conference at the Canadian Civil Defence College outside this town 40 miles northwest of Ottawa.

A report issued by the college said the conference learned that progress in evacuation planning during the last year was speeded up and more progress was made than at any time since Canada's civil defence planning began.

The conference, considering civil defence plans at municipal, provincial and federal levels, found that almost all metropolitan target areas now have well-advanced evacuation blueprints.

"Through this meeting," said F. P. Worthington, federal civil defence co-ordinator, "we now know that there is a well-trained nucleus of civil defence workers across Canada who are ready at a moment's notice to expend themselves in the interests and safety of our population."

Provincial officials attending the conference included Maj. - Gen. H. H. Ganong, New Brunswick co-ordinator; Air Vice - Marshal A. L. Morfee, Nova Scotia co-ordinator, and J. V. Rabbits, Newfoundland deputy co-ordinator.

31 DIE IN FLOODS RANGOON, Burma (Reuters)—At least 31 persons were reported killed Monday as mountain streams swollen by monsoon downpours swamped the small town of Wundwin, 160 miles north of Mandalay. More than 65 houses were swept away and another 120 dwellings were severely damaged.
