Professor Brendan O'Grady, head of the English Department recently gave the key note address to members assembled at the National Catholic Rural Life Conference at Saginaw, Michigan. This was the 30th annual convention of this body which was formed by the hierarchy to deal with specific problems of rural living, and, especially this year, the problem of immigration. In addition to his main address, "Catholic Philosophy of Rural Life," Mr. O'Grady spoke to student groups in and around Saginaw.

The "good showing" by the first team which was promised last week proved to be a gross understatement, as anyone who saw the game last Saturday will testify. It was rather a wonderful showing and in every sense of the word a triumph of purpose and synchronization of action, backed by the reverberating cheers of the supporters, all combined to make last Saturday's game a real treat in sports. It had a distinct note of optimism, not the naive kind struck by those trying to avoid pessimism, but a very sane optimism such as is had by those who face reality not unmindful of religious values. Although many of the thoughts of his speech had been given the students before in the course of studies, in this particular context they were very effective in bringing home a panoramic view of the world as seen through the eyes of a Catholic. 
