

Moderator Gives Inspiring Sermon In Kirk

preaching before a large and reverent congregation yesterday morning in the Kirk of St. James, The Right Reverend W. A. Cameron, M.A., D.D., LL.D., Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, took as his text the words, "Who is my Neighbour?" (St. Luke 10: 29, 37) and pointed out how that the world had become a neighborhood through the advances in the sciences of intercommunication and travel and how this had brought an extra responsibility on the part of nations that had been blessed materially to share with these not so favoured. He commended the services of the United Nations organization in providing for the relief of illiteracy and disease among Asiatic countries especially and the part Canada was playing in sharing the work of the Colombo Plan. Turning to the place of the Church in this area of need he discussed many phases of the modern missionary enterprise and urged the fullest possible support on the part of every member of the Church. He related the joy he had experienced in sharing in some of the developments among the missionaries of Formosa where the Church's missionaries, the Rev. and Mrs. James Dickson are having such encouraging results. Welcoming the Moderator, the Minister of the Kirk, the Rev. T. H. B. Somers, said that it is always a pleasure for a congregation to receive the Church's Moderator when he happened to be one so well known, so much trusted, and so dearly loved as Dr. Cameron is. "It was a happiness enjoyed all the more."

The music for the service was under the direction of the Church organist, Miss E. Lillian McKenzie, and included the introl "The Lord is in His Holy Temple" and the anthem, "Oh for a Closer Walk with God" (Poster) with soprano solo by Miss Barbara Rogers. Before the service commenced the Moderator received the members of the Kirk Session in the Vestry and at its close an informal reception was held on the chancel steps when members of the congregation were introduced to the Moderator by the Minister and the Clerk of the Kirk Session, Mr. Neil MacLean.

Mission Priest Honored By St. Thomas Aquinas Society

Rev. Cornelius Pineau, S.J., acknowledged in the above terms an address in French presented to him on behalf of St. Thomas Aquinas Society at a largely attended reception in the Clover Club yesterday afternoon.

The address was read by Mr. Frank Doiron, followed by the English rendition which was read by Mr. Leo Doiron and likewise acknowledged. "I have listened with greatest pleasure to the expression of your heart, and although not worthy I deeply appreciate your kindness and the great interest you have always taken in my Mission work."

The address was accompanied by a purse presented by Mrs. Jerome Gallant, president of St. Thomas Aquinas Society on behalf of that organization.
Rev. Father Pineau, in his address, conducted his audience through the triumphs of his early entry into the mission field of China 18 years ago down to the reverses and inhuman treatment received at the hands of the Japanese and later Communist oppressors, terminating in his expulsion from the land he had learned to love so well.

"In conversation with those in authority at Rome," Father Pineau said, "it was made clear to me that the Communists are willing to sacrifice everything to attain their ends. In a year or two India may fall to their insidious propaganda while France and Italy are being so influenced that they may fall at any time."

"No matter where we strive or how we pray, all should be for the glory of God, and the salvation of our souls will follow naturally," Father Pineau concluded.

The speaker was introduced by the chairman, Mr. Edmund Areenault who also presented the various numbers of the musical programme, opening with "O Canada" and concluding with "The Queen". The St. Thomas Aquinas choir sang the Acadian folk song "Evangeline" in French in a most effective manner and in closing they rendered "Ave Marie Stella" in French and "Perfect Day" in English. Mrs. John Walsh, Sr., was soloist.
Mr. Frank McIntyre was in splendid voice as he sang "Panes Angelicus" (Caesare Franck). Mr. Leo Chaisson directed the choir and the accompanists were Miss Marion Dougan and Austin Connolly. A social period followed in

which refreshments were served by the ladies.

Text of Address
Following is the address presented to Rev. Father Pineau:
"Reverend and Dear Father:
"The years roll by swiftly and surely bringing with them revelations which the present, as yet, does not know, and the past knows all too well. How little we dreamed when as school children we read in profane and sacred history of the glorious deeds and heroic

deaths of the early martyrs that it would be our privilege and challenge to live in an era comparable and even surpassing that of the "Age of Martyrs."
"And what an awakening to all of us in this peaceful corner of the world to realize that one of our very own, that you, dear Reverend Father, have endured great hardships and have experienced persecution and peril in order to help keep the torch of faith burning in Communist China.
"We followed with great interest and fervent prayer your apostolic career in the Cause of Christ in the Orient. We are grateful to God that He has brought you safely home from the concentration camps of Japan and from the irreligious and insidious clutches of the Red persecution in China. We know your missionary heart yearns to return and give your life if necessary, for your beloved China."
