The alarm works well and it is the intention of the Chief Engineer to have his house thus connected with the Station.

WE are glad to see the militia authorities have taken advantage of the visit of Major Rabon, Inspector of Engineers, to instruct him to inspect and report upon the best means of making Charlottetown secure against the sudden attack of an enemy. The Inspector will visit the land at the harbor's mouth and narrows for this purpose.

A SCHOONER which arrived at Souris yesterday brought the dead body of a boy named Bucho, which was found in a castaway boat near Cape Breton shore. One of the sailors of the schooner said he knew the boy, and said he belonged to Harbor Bucho. It is supposed he was swimming from the boat, met with an accident, was carried to sea and perished.

GEORGE CHOKER, blacksmith of Sharon Springs, Ont., on the 5th inst., tied an anchor to his leg and drowned himself in Otsego Lake. He leaves a wife and child, with whom he did not live for years. He left letters saying that his desires were so great to kill his father-in-law, who had separated him and his wife, that he concluded that it was better to make away with himself. He speaks highly of his wife, and had the child's picture in his hand when he jumped from the boat. His body has not been found. He had been drinking.

The State of Maine a total Wreck. ST. JOHN, N. B., July 13. The steamship State of Maine, which went ashore at Point Lepreau on Saturday, will be a total loss. All the passengers were landed and steamboats are now landing the freight and all that can be saved. The State of Maine was built in 1882, and was a fine boat, and it is a great loss to the company.

An Orange and Green Riot. BELFAST, July 13. A serious conflict took place here yesterday, one man, a Roman Catholic, was shot, probably fatally. Numbers were wounded. WHITEHAVEN, July 13. Serious fighting took place at Cleaton yesterday, one boy was killed, and a number were wounded.

The Egyptian Troubles. LONDON, July 13. The St. James' Gazette says the Government has received information that Osman Digna, the Egyptian rebel, has seized Asia, a port on the Red Sea, six miles south of Suakin.

Cholera Victims. PARIS, July 13. During the twenty-four hours ending at nine o'clock to-night, there were seventeen deaths from cholera at Marseilles and thirty-six at Toulon. Two Sisters of Charity were among those who died at Toulon.

Precautions Against Cholera. LONDON, July 12. The Admiralty has ordered rigorous precautions against cholera to be taken in the navy.

Murder in Ireland. NEWRY, July 13. An Orangeman killed a nationalist here yesterday. He was arrested.

THE annual meeting of the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia convened at Amherst, N. S., on the 11th inst. About 50 delegates are in attendance. The first afternoon was occupied with preliminaries and active work commenced on the 12th inst. The association will be in session till Tuesday. Particular attention will be given to educational and missionary operations, both home and abroad. Rev. Walter Bars will be sent to Bristol Columbia to take charge of Baptist interests there. As in other missionary bodies in the world, great prominence is given to the Women's Missionary Aid societies, who hold services in connexion with three associations in the Province. The meetings are always interesting, but attended by ladies only.

DURING the first six months of this year 46,607 immigrants settled in Canada. The total settlers for the same period in 1883 were 55,907, but taken generally the immigrants this year are better and a better off body. Twelve thousand more persons came in the six months from the United States to settle in Canada than went from Canada to settle in the States.

ORILLIA is thinking of holding a semi-centennial to commemorate the landing there in 1834 of the first white settler. An Indian village, the inhabitants of which afterwards moved to Rama, occupied the site of Orillia previous to the advent of the white man. The memory of all events of the nature of a first settlement should be kept green. If Orillia decides to follow the example of Toronto, no doubt many of our citizens will lend their help.—Toronto Globe.

James Street, for many years engineer of the fastest train on the Lehigh and Susquehanna railroad, was taken to an insane asylum in Philadelphia on the 8th inst. His insanity developed itself last week. When approaching Mauch Chunk the mania suddenly broke out and instead of slackening up he opened the throttle-valve wide and the train dashed past at the speed of a mile a minute. The terrified passengers thought the engineer had lost control of the engine. After running a few miles at this thrilling rate of speed the conductor signalled to stop and the madman obeyed the order. He was ordered to back the train to Mauch Chunk, which he did, and was then seized. On the 7th inst. he manifested a desire to kill some one. Excessive pondering over some mechanical appliance for railroad engines caused his mind to go wrong. He had long been regarded as one of the best engineers on the road.

Graziers in the State of Texas are seriously alarmed at the fecundity of the prairie dog. These pests thicken in a tract of country 200 miles long by 250 miles wide. They eat the grass in summer and the grass roots in winter, so that it is said that a region which a few years ago was the finest grazing ground in America is rapidly becoming a verdureless desert. The Albany, Texas, "News" says that could they be destroyed instantly, as by a stroke of lightning, the price of land in all the regions described would rise 100 per cent as soon as the fact was known.

It is a noticeable fact that Blaine finds the chief opposition to his candidacy among the better class of Republicans, while Cleveland, generally speaking, is opposed only by the Tammany Hall braves and the "Apollo" faction of the Democratic party.
