East Coast Fishermen Demanding Equal Rights With Foreign-owned Trawlers

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's trawler fishermen Wednesday demanded rights equal to those granted foreigners...

In other countries, particularly Venezuela where the duty is "very high." The federal and Nova Scotia governments should compensate fishermen whose earnings may be affected by construction of the Nova Scotia Causeway linking the Nova Scotia mainland with Cape Breton Island.

Under international law, foreign trawlers can move in as close as three miles off the Canadian coasts to drag for fish. But, because of a federal law, Canadian trawlers cannot come closer than 12 miles in the Maritime area.

This federal law, passed 20 years ago, resulted from complaints by inshore fishermen that the trawlers, with their baglike nets dragging over the ocean floor, destroyed inshore fishing gear and took too many fish.

But Wednesday, before the Fisheries Council of Canada, Maritime spokesmen expressed concern over the increasing number of foreign trawlers operating just outside the three-mile territorial limit.

The final upshot was that the council adopted a resolution demanding that the government also give Canadian trawlers the right to fish in the three-mile limit.

UNFAIR ADVANTAGE

The council said the Canadian trawlers would agree to stay 12 miles off the coast, if their competitors also are forced to do so.

But the council said it has been advised "There is no indication when an international agreement on the 12-mile limit can be reached." Meanwhile trawlers from the United States and unfair advantage.

The council also asked: 1. The government to explore the possibility of getting cuts on high tariffs on salt and other fish

products.

2. The federal and Nova Scotia governments should compensate fishermen whose earnings may be affected by construction of the Nova Scotia Causeway linking the Nova Scotia mainland with Cape Breton Island.

The Canso strait will be closed to navigation for about a year after the causeway is completed, the council said. It will "seriously disrupt" fishing operations and cut possible earnings by fishermen at such points as Mulgrave, Canso and Petit-de-Grat.

STRAWBERRY GROWERS ASS'N PLANS TO PURCHASE PROCESSING PLANT

A resolution empowering the directors to draw up a plan for the acquisition of a plant for the processing and canning of strawberries and other small fruits and vegetables was unanimously passed at a meeting of the Prince Edward Island Strawberry Growers' Association held last night at the Hotel Club. Mr. Malcolm Reeves presided. The resolution further provided that the plan be presented to a future, and it is hoped a larger meeting, for their approval and its presentation to the Provincial Government for assistance under the Industrial Development Act passed at the last session of the House.

Mr. Reeves outlined the purpose of the meeting which was to acquire facilities for the canning and processing of strawberries as a nucleus and to take care of the

processing of smaller fruits and vegetables as well. He pointed out that the strawberry grower has come to the point where he has enough security to increase production since most of the crop is sold before it is picked. He made it clear that the producer must put up some capital to take care of the industry, otherwise it could not expand.

Mr. C. L. MacLean, manager of the Co-op Super Market said, "We must go ahead or go back." He stated that last year he turned down five times as many orders as he was able to fill. Mr. MacLean proposed a two-cent levy per box to provide money for the programme. He felt that the profit from the processing of the other smaller fruits and vegetables would be sufficient to liquidate the loan required.

Mr. J. L. Dewar, secretary of the Federation of Agriculture, stated that "the primary right of the producer was to follow his product as closely as possible to the market." He recalled that several other industries in this province started on a small scale and he left it to the opinion of the meeting as to whether they had made money or not. Mr. Dewar cautioned that if the growers did not take steps to provide for expansion in the industry, someone else would, in which case the farmer would have no chance of participating in the profits.

Most of the growers present expressed their views on the matter. Each felt that the time had come to make a move toward expansion; some thought that the potentialities were terrific while others felt that it would certainly have a stabilizing effect on the Island economy.

Mr. Bruneau (L - Glen-garry-Prescott) said the Quebec income tax tends only to separate Quebec from the government of their country.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an atmosphere of growing bitterness, Senate investigators of the McCarthy-Army controversy took up the question Wednesday whether Army Secretary Robert Stevens had "threatened reprisals" against a general for praising and cooperating with Senator Joseph McCarthy.

This new line of inquiry developed near the end of a day punctuated by irate exchanges between McCarthy and opponents—especially over new army charges of deluge treatment for Pte. G. David Schine, former aide of McCarthy who was drafted into the army.

At that point McCarthy cried "Smear!" and called the televised hearings a "circus." Later he accused Stevens of "flagrant dishonesty," and the army secretary flared back: "I deeply resent the suggestion."

However, he added, the seasonal unemployment picture is growing more serious each winter.

"While I cannot claim we could completely eliminate seasonal unemployment with a climate like ours," he said, "I firmly believe that we can do a great deal more than we have done in the past."

"It is a question largely of finding ways and means of providing greater stability of employment in our seasonal industries. This will require the co-operation of employers, unions, consumers and governments."

Methods suggested by the national employment committee included diversification of production, stockpiling of goods, influencing of consumer spending habits and the transferring of workers among branches of industry that have different seasonal peaks. Each industry should study the problem.

Services for Mussolini

ROME (AP) — Memorial services were held Tuesday in several Rome churches for Benito Mussolini, Italian Fascist leader who with his mistress was slain and hanged by the heels from a Milan service station nine years ago. No incidents were reported.
