Alcoholic Spouse Presents Many Problems To Wife

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: I am 51, married for the second time. My first marriage was not to happy, but was far better than this has been.

My husband, whom I love very much, is an alcoholic. He stops drinking for a while, six to eight months, then drinks for months losing jobs. In the 10 years we have been married he hasn't held any job longer than a year. And we've been penniless at times, facing first-of-the-month bills.

I have a son by my first marriage. He is married to a very nice girl and they have a son whom I love dearly. My husband also loves him dearly, until he starts drinking. Then he has a poor way of showing love for anyone.

In the past I was self-reliant and accumulated a home; and I would like to be on my own again, but my age and health do not favor it. At 51, I am too old for employment and too young for social security help.

My son, angered by my husband's spendthrift drinking which I've tried to conceal, want me to live with him; but I dread breaking up housekeeping. The house needs repairs which we can't afford, and my only pocket money is what my son pays me for baby sitting.

Sometimes I think I'd be better satisfied, afterward, if we broke up. But then I wonder. One thing sure, I've nothing to look forward to in this situation. I am very depressed, have lost interest in homemaking, don't want to go out, I just stagnate and worry.

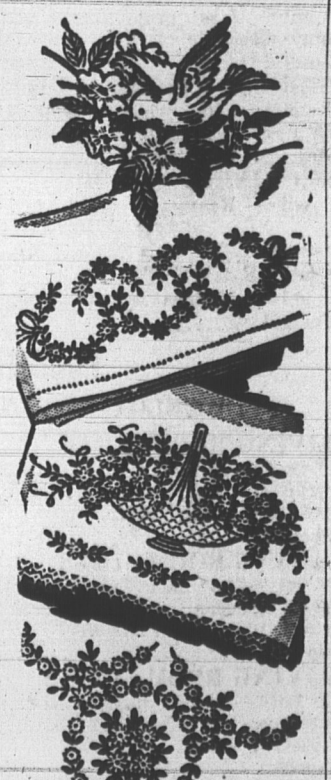
It looks as if I'll have to do something soon. And I would like to do what is best in God's sight. Please give me your opinions, K. R.

DEAR K. R.: In your letter, here, condensed you mention that your husband goes to church when sober and also has attended Alcoholic Anonymous meetings. You don't say whether or not this is due to your prodding. But if it were wholly on his own initiative, sparked by his true wish to "drop out," I should think he might be making a better showing by now, towards getting control of himself, drink-wise.

Oven-Baked Fish Sticks Easy-Do Dinner Entree

As a nation, we have not begun to tap the endless kinds and quantities of fish and shellfish in ocean waters. We gripe about the higher cost of meat and never stop to think we could keep expenses down if we regularly have two fish days a week.

Fish has many nutritional assets. It is one of our most important sources of iodine and other minerals; it is rich in vitamins; it is low in cholesterol; high in protein.

Proper Preparation
Fish should be properly deboned and cooked at moderate heat. It is very digestible.

Men like fish when properly cooked. And if you doubt children like fish, visit a school-lunch at noon some Friday. You will find the youngsters enthusiastically enjoying baked or pan-fried fish, fillets, bowls of fish chowder, or tasty fish sticks.

OVEN DINNER
TOMORROW'S EASY-DO OVEN DINNER
Manhattan Clam Chowder (homemade or canned)
Oven-Baked Fish Sticks
Tomato Sauce
Buttered Green Beans

with Carrots
Warm Raisin Buns
Coffee, Tea, Milk
Measurements level; recipes for 6

OVEN-BAKED FISH STICKS
Prepare 2 fish sticks per person as follows: Brush each fish stick with a few drops of cooking oil. For 6 persons, dust fish all over with a mixture of 1/2 tsp. each seasoned salt and Accent.

Place fish in a pan; heat 10 min. in a mod. oven, 375 degrees F. Turn once. Serve with heated canned tomato sauce or tomato-mushroom sauce.

BROWNED WHIPPED POTATO
Beat 1 egg light, then whip it into 5 c. whipped potato (fresh or flakes). Pile potato into a well-buttered or margarine low 3-pt. casserole. Dot the top with

2 tsp. butter or margarine. Bake 15 min. in a mod. oven, 375 degrees F. or until browned.

SUNDAY DINNER
Black Bean Soup (canned), Sizzling Croutons-Celery, Assorted Pickles, Carrot Sticks—Broiled, Sectioned, Broiler-Fryers, Baked Sausage, Filled White Potatoes, Escalloped Stewed Tomato, Pineapple Chunks with Lemon-Milk Sherbet-Coffee, Tea, Milk.

POTATOES
(Adds More Flavor to a Chicken Dinner)
6 medium-size baking potatoes
1/2 lb. sausage meat
1/2 tsp. cooking oil

Seasoned salt to taste
1/2 c. hot meat broth
or 1/2 c. hot water and 1/4 tsp. broth powder.

Pare potatoes. Cut 1/2" from tops to form covers. Hollow these out and set aside. Scoop shells 1/2" thick. Fill shells with sausage meat, rounding it on top. Fit on the "covers." Brush filled potato shells with cooking oil. Place them in pan. Dust with seasoned salt to taste. Pour in the meat broth.

Bake 1 1/2 hr. in mod. oven, 375 degrees F. Baste occasionally with broth. Serve with milk gravy for luncheon.

Note: Use the scooped out raw potato when making potato soup or a fish chowder.

THE CHEF'S WARM CLING PEACH COMPOTE
In our test-kitchen, we've discovered that canned cling peaches have finer flavor when served as a warm compote especially useful in cold weather.

To Prepare: In 3-pt. saucepan, combine 1 (1 lb. 14 oz) can cling peaches and 5 whole cloves. Bring to boiling-point. Simmer 3 min, remove from heat. Cover; serve warm. Do not refrigerate as it lessens the fine flavor.
