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# Strawberry Harvest Fast Reaching Peak On Island

The strawberry crop on the Island is about reaching its peak according to Mr. Norman MacLeod of the Charlottetown Strawberry Exchange which is daily handling large quantities of berries for processing in the frozen food market. He predicted that the best of the berries would probably be harvested by the latter part of this week.

At the start of the season it was thought that due to an increase in the crop across the continent and due to the dumping of United States berries on the market with the resulting backing up of processed berries in storage, Island Farmers would have to take a severe reduction in price over former years.

However, a very poor crop in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick has resulted in a reasonably good market for Island growers. It is of note that Islands growers during the past three years received a much higher price for

their berries than in any other part of the North American continent and this year California growers received eight cents a lb while Michigan growers got 10 cents.

Yesterday a Guardian representative was shown some of the berries grown by Mr. Elmer Jay of Mount Stewart. Mr. Jay is experimenting with a new variety known as "Catskill." These berries grow to a giant size and the flavour proved to be excellent. The Mount Stewart grower is also experimenting with the "Sparkle" variety which he hopes to have in production next year.

Both varieties are said to bear heavy crops and berries of unusual size and it is hoped that their quality will enable the shipment to more distant points. These varieties are also expected to yield well on the second and third year after planting.

Stewart Exchange is under the management of Mr. Lane Pigott. This year both exchanges are putting their stress on high quality, with the purpose of maintaining the name of Island berries. In this respect they are co-operating closely with Government inspectors to turn out the best pack ever.

It is probably not generally known that in the commercial field, 90 per cent of the cups of frozen berries which the customer buys in the Maritime Provinces are processed here in P. E. I.

Prince Edward Island berries are also used by several companies in Upper Canada who wish to put out a superior product of fine flavour such as strawberry topping for ice cream sundaes and fancy quality jams.

While large quantities of berries are being processed, the export of the fresh fruit crop is three times as great as in any previous year and large trucks are leaving the mainland nightly for mainland points.

## Credit Buying On The Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Credit buying in Canada last May put 17.4 per cent more "on the cuff" than during the same month last year, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. The total \$781,000,000 was 3.3 per cent more than during April. Small loan companies and licensed money lenders had \$352,000,000 out at May 30, one per cent more than during April and 11.1 per cent more than last year at the same time.

## Monarchy After Franco Is Gone

MADRID (Reuters)—One of Gen. Francisco Franco's chief aides told the Cortes (parliament) Monday that when Franco dies or gives up power he will be replaced by a monarchy.

Carrero Blanco, a navy captain, is one of Franco's close collaborators. He has acted as go-between since the 64-year-old chief of state and Don Juan, pretender to the Spanish throne.

Francisco is expected to bypass Don Juan and select Prince Juan Carlos, 19, Don Juan's son and grandson of Spain's last king, Don Alfonso XIII.

Carrero Blanco said that the monarchy which replaces Franco will not have the same powers as the generalissimo "who as an exceptional man won the Spanish civil war and reconquered Spain."

Carrero Blanco promised the government was preparing a menu which would give "greater scope to the debates in the Cortes" and which would be a reform of present parliamentary procedure.

Spain was ruled by monarchs of the Aragon, Bourbon and Hapsburg families until 1931 when the dictatorship of Gen. Primo de Rivera was overthrown.

A republic was proclaimed and King Alfonso XIII left the country. The civil war began in 1936 after the left-wing government initiated a program of land and social reforms. The war ended after three years of bitter fighting, the forces of Gen. Franco the victors.

Under a law of 1947, Spain was declared to be a monarchy, with Franco empowered to choose the occupant.

## Stresses Importance Of Metropolitan Problems

"It is a shame that no action has been taken following the submission of the report on Metropolitan Charlottetown," F. J. Storey Committee chairman said in addressing Rotarians at their weekly luncheon meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

In a brief but comprehensive report on the highlights of the submission, Mr. Storey stressed the need for prompt action of some kind and said he feared that another ten years might elapse before the matter would be up for further consideration.

"In such case I see a regrettable and unnecessary expenditure on the part of home builders in Parkdale and Spring Park which will ultimately be futile in meeting their requirement," Mr. Storey said.

This project fairly bristles with problems of highways, roads and sidewalks, police and fire protection, education and health, sanitation and finance, the solution of which will require the "imaginative skill and resourcefulness of able and most far-seeing leaders."

The speaker was introduced by chairman Rus Seller and thanked by co-chairman Earl Baker.

## Co-op Has Capital Of \$2 Millions

KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Annapolis Valley apple growers Monday announced formation of the Scotian Gold Co-operative Limited, with an operating capital of \$2,000,000.

General Manager Arthur Calkin said the company, known since 1912 as the United Fruit Companies of Nova Scotia Limited, will go into operation Aug. 1.

"There will be no actual change in physical assets, liabilities or ownership," he said, "but business will be carried on under a more modern type of legislation."

The new company is a result of recent recommendations by the Walker royal commission on fruit, which suggested a re-organization of United Fruit to permit direct membership of growers.
