NEWS OF THE WORLD.

The influenza epidemic is decreasing in London, Eng. A Colorado miner has sent an internal machine to President Cleveland.

The great Manchester ship canal was opened for general traffic on Monday last. The Paris papers say that France is preparing to send 20,000 troops to Madagascar.

The C. P. R. land sales in Manitoba for 1893 amounted to \$107,500 acres, realizing \$355,000.

Great Britain is forced to levy new taxes upon its people in order to make good a threatened deficit. It is reported that the city of Chicago has been robbed of \$1,200,000 by means of fraudulent pay-rolls and in other ways.

One Mrs. Hayon, a colored woman, who was formerly a slave, as was her late husband, has left \$5,000 to Harvard college for the benefit of poor and colored students.

Canada's foreign trade for the fiscal year 1893, is the biggest on record, being \$247,694,000, compared with \$211,369,000 in 1892. The export amounted to \$118,619,000, the highest point in the history of the Dominion.

A despatch from Paris to the St. James Gazette says that the wine growers in the south of France are so overglutted with their produce that they offer wine at one penny per quart, but fail to obtain that price. The splendid vintage has made wine a drug in the market. New wine cost more than the wine needed to fill them.

Miss Lizzie Knapp, of Torrington, Conn., twenty-four years of age, was stricken blind on Friday. She was sitting with Miss Pauline Brill, whom she was visiting. They were sewing and chatting. Suddenly Miss Knapp rose and went to the window, remarking it was getting dark. A moment later she sank in her companion's arms saying, "Oh, God! I'm blind." A messenger with a diamond ring from Miss Knapp's fiancé arrived a short time afterwards.

Commenting on the Pendergast verdict, the Chicago Herald says: It is a righteous verdict and sentence. A murderous crank is as accountable at the bar of reason as any person who commits murder. The Times says: Exact and speedy justice has been done by the court and jury. Pendergast's conviction deals a fatal blow to the plea of criminal lawyers, backed up by opinionated physicians that eccentricity is a complete defense to the charge of murder.

Fire occurred in John Cummings' cottage, at Omaha, early on Sunday morning. Cummings, his wife, and child aged three, and Mrs. Margaret Fox, mother to Mrs. Cummings, were burned to death. Tommie Fox, a grandson of Mrs. Fox, says Cummings overturned a lamp in the bedroom when the four were in that room and held the door shut so none could escape. Tommie says he tried to open the door from the outside, but could not. It is supposed that Cummings was insane with the delirium tremens.

Andrew Carnegie telegraphs from New York to the Pittsburg Times that the proposition embodied in his letter addressed to Robert Pitcairn, a member of the local relief committee, means that he will donate the money already subscribed to the fund as well as duplicate all that may be subscribed within the time specified in his letters. From the above telegram Mr. Carnegie stands pledged to contribute \$60,794, the amount subscribed by many, and means the provision of work for 2,000 men for 30 days. It was the committee's purpose that more should be done before Mr. Carnegie's generous promises were made known to the public, but the work of collecting subscriptions will not be permitted to stop at this point.
