Royal Couple Says Good-Bye To Washington

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh left for Canada today, assured by President Truman that never before had the United States been visited by "such a wonderful young couple."

The official good-byes were said in the White House rose garden, on a cold, misty day. But Truman beamed warmly as he told the Royal Couple: "We have many distinguished visitors here in this city, but never before have we had such a wonderful young couple."

He told them to come back soon and bring the children. Truman said a world with no war will depend in a great measure on how well Britain and the United States work and stick together.

"I am sure," he said, "that we will do a better job for world peace because your visit here has tightened the bonds between us."

A few moments later they were whisked to the airport. Before they boarded the plane for Montreal Elizabeth shook hands with each of the motorcycle cops who had escorted her about Washington.

Next stop for the Royal Couple: a week-end in the Laurentian Mountains to rest before continuing their Canadian tour Monday. In a jam-packed day today they saw the Washington Cathedral, the Supreme Court Building, the Library of Congress, and the House and Senate in a whirlwind windup to their 45-hour visit.

Crowds waited in the cold to cheer the pair at each stop. Elizabeth was dressed in green — hat, coat and dress — and Philip wore a double-breasted blue suit.

So efficiently was today's tour run that Elizabeth and Philip were ahead of schedule most of the way. Even the good-byes were said three minutes early, catching some of the broadcasting companies with their networks down. But recordings were made for rebroadcasting later.

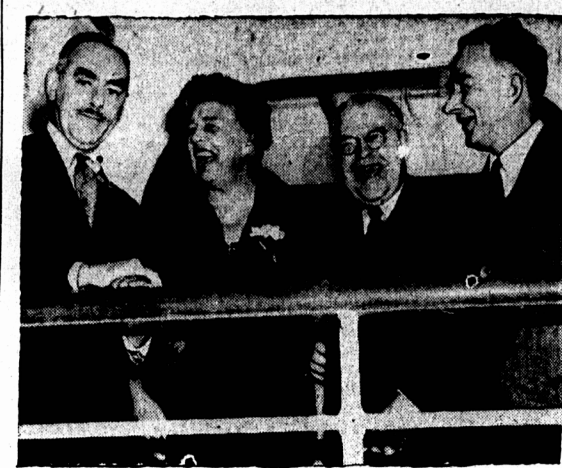
The real purpose of the White House visit was to present Truman with a candelabra and a looking glass for the renovated White House, gifts from the King.

"We have spent two very happy days as your guests," Elizabeth told Truman. "I feel this ceremony makes a fitting climax to what has been a delightful and memorable occasion for both of us."

After the ceremony, the President and Mrs. Truman conducted the Royal Visitors on a brief tour of the White House. Truman also gave the couple some small personal gifts, including a large close-up photograph of the Princess taken by the Associated Press last night and a photograph of himself, autographed to both of them.

Island Potatoes Featured In Food Council Exhibits

Apart from being entered successfully in the contests at the Maritime Winter Fair, Prince Edward Island potatoes are also among the exhibits in the Maritime Food Council Educational Booth at Amherst, it was learned yesterday from C. E. Shaw, of the fruit and vegetable division, Dominion Department of Agriculture.

The potato exhibit at the booth is designed to show the various grades and also the small consumers pack, for which there has been a greatly increased demand, and with C. FitzRandolph of Bridgewater, N.S. in charge of the booth, agricultural officials from the three Maritime Provinces are present to explain and invite comments from visitors.

The shippers of the Province have given good co-operation in the supplying of the small packs, said Mr. Shaw, who returned from Amherst on Thursday, and will leave again for the Fair on Monday for the balance of the show. W. P. MacLeod, Senior Inspector with the Division, went to Amherst with Mr. Shaw and will remain there until Monday.

Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

The weekly Magistrate's Court was held on Wednesday, October 31 at the Court House in Georgetown before Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, K.C.
