The Governor General at Toronto.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16. There is little doubt that Mr. Thomas White will be the Minister of Agriculture, vice Hon. Mr. Pope, who takes the portfolio of Railways.

Great Indignation.

LONDON, Sept. 16. Great indignation is felt at the death of the Lieutenant of the Zephyr. The French are more severely censured than the Chinese.

The Public Agitated.

LONDON, Sept. 16. The public are agitated at the condition of affairs and meetings are being convened to urge a mediation before the French march on Peking.

The Nile Expedition.

CAIRO, Sept. 16. In the event that the Nile route is adhered to for the Soudan expedition, eight battalions will go to Berber. Three will remain there, the other five will push on to Khartoum, two other battalions will guard the line of march to the rear of Berber.

The Cholera.

MADRID, Sept. 16. Twelve deaths from cholera to-day are reported in East Pyrenees.

NAPLES, Sept. 16. There is a slight increase in the number of cholera cases.

MADRID, Sept. 16. At Terragona there have been thirty cases and eleven deaths from cholera during the past three days.

PARIS, Sept. 16. The receipts of the *feces* in this city, given in behalf of the cholera sufferers, amounted to \$20,000.

The total number of animals imported into Great Britain during 1883, from countries outside of the United Kingdom, is 1,624,882, against 1,483,838 in 1882. From European countries, exclusive of the Channel Islands, the numbers were 262,455 cattle, 929,944 sheep and 34,723 swine. From Canada, were received 53,177 cattle, 94,286 sheep and two swine, against 37,371 cattle and 68,873 sheep in 1882, a most encouraging increase.

The business of the Erie Canal has seriously decreased this year, the total tonnage transported in August having been only 769,270 tons, against 994,985 tons in the corresponding period last year, and 806,243 tons in 1882. A reduction of 225,115 tons in a single month, or 25 per cent, is a serious matter, and does not, on its face, tell favorably for the free canal policy; but the loss of trade has been due wholly to the decrease in the aggregate transportation trade, the railways losing in much the same proportion.
