ANOTHER BIG FIRE.—The Oland brewery at Dartmouth was destroyed by fire on Monday afternoon. The origin of the fire is unknown. The place was owned by the English syndicate which recently purchased all the breweries in the Maritime Provinces except Kent's, and was the largest and best equipped of the lot. The building, machinery and stock was worth about \$120,000. There was \$75,000 insurance.

Sir Charles Keeps His Own Counsel.

What Public Opinion Says.

OTTAWA, April 29.

The personnel of Sir Charles Tupper's cabinet cannot yet be given. The Premier is keeping his own counsel. He states that possibly to-morrow or next day he will be in a position to make an announcement. Public opinion points to Hon. Mr. Chapleau as coming in of certainty, but under what conditions remain to be seen.

It is definitely settled that Hugh John Macdonald is to be Minister of the Interior. Whether this means Mr. Daly's stepping out altogether or being given a new department has not transpired. The general opinion is that Mr. Daly will take the place of Justice Killam in the Court of the Queen's Bench, Manitoba, who will succeed Justice Gwynne on the Supreme Court bench here.

A. H. O'Brien has been appointed assistant law clerk of the Commons.
