A CURIOUS DOCUMENT.—Mrs. Cunard, of Indianston, wife of the late Robert Cunard, has in her possession a curious document. It is the commission given by Governor Parr, in 1783, to Mr. Cunard's father as lieutenant of militia. Though the date of the commission is 1783, it gives the officer jurisdiction over the territory from Nova Scotia to the Peninsula of Florida, thus refusing to recognize the Declaration of Independence and the result of the war.—St. John Telegraph.

ACCIDENT.—The New Glasgow Chronicle says: "While Mrs. Dr. Ings, daughter and sister were driving from Stellarton to New Glasgow on Saturday afternoon last, the horse became unmanageable near the Catholic Church, west side, and ran towards New Glasgow, turning down Blair Street, south of D. S. Fraser's residence, at Wm. Betts' corner, tipped the wagon throwing the occupants out. Mrs. Ings was badly cut on her head. The others escaped uninjured.

They have been obliged to change some of their dates in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; hence the delay in arrival here. Their repertoire includes the Black Flag, Forget Me Not, Queen's Evidence, the Midnight Mystery, and many other good plays.

ASPHALT WALK.—The road committee of the Fredericton City Council have decided to lay about 7,000 yards of asphalt walk this summer. They have already made arrangements with the gas company for coal tar, and they expect in a few days to close a contract with Mr. Fisher, of St. John, for what asphalt is needed. Mr. Fisher has already made an offer to the corporation, and the road committee have the Council's authority to accept if they think it best to do so, says the Gleaner.

NEW ECO CASE.—Mr. Eusebius Peters, of New Acadia, King's County, or died at THE EXAMINER Office yesterday afternoon, and exhibited a sample egg case invented by him which he claims is superior to anything in that line at present in use. In size the case is the same as that ordinarily used, and has two compartments each one fast by means of two spring hinges at one end and two iron cleats at the other. The case is easily handled, and it cannot be opened except by pressing the springs. It is made of ordinary soft wood. Mr. Peters informs us that it is his intention to have his invention patented.

Canadian Banks During March. (The Empire.)

The reports of Canadian banks during the important month of March show how strong is the financial condition of Canada and reveal a most favorable comparison with the United States, Australia, and even Great Britain. We have had no great failures or fears of failure and no special financial stringency, whilst business in other countries is being carried on under strained conditions or at a terrible loss. During March, according to figures quoted by The Monetary Times from the bank returns, the customers and depositors, (chiefly the former), called for and received nearly \$10,000,000 of extra money.

It is evident that this money was withdrawn for business purposes and is now in circulation. The \$7,500,000 loaned on discounts above the sum lent in the previous month was obviously intended for such a use, and not for speculative objects. This is clearly proved by a recapitulation of the sources from which this money was derived by the banks. The following table shows the diminution in certain investments during the month of March:

That the sum of \$19,458,000 employed in Call loans on stocks and bonds making has been so slightly decreased, proves that the Banks were anxious to accommodate the demands of commercial men and trade generally without materially affecting the interests of those connected with the Stock Exchange, by whom surplus money is so largely employed. Altogether the situation is interesting as showing the comparatively vast resources which our banks have to meet any unusual demand which may touch the month in question, they only touched the \$20,000,000 due by United States Banks, though no doubt the April returns will show a heavy decrease in that particular phase of investment.

PERSONAL. R. L. McDonald, Esq., of Souris, was a passenger on the western train this morning for Boston, where he intends making his future home. Mr. McDonald is well and favorably known throughout King's County, having served a number of years as deputy sheriff in a very satisfactory manner.

CHINAMEN FOR HAVANA.—The Quebec express was about two hours behind time in reaching Montreal on Thursday morning. She has on board 213 Chinamen in bond bound from China to Havana. A revolution is at present in progress in the Spanish West Indies, and the Chinamen, who are to engage on the sugar plantations, may meet with a warm reception.—Times.

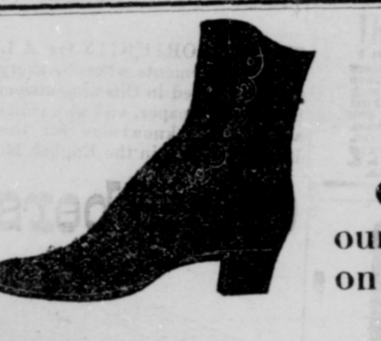
