

# Saint John Golfer Leads In Tournament

## Bob Gray Runner-Up With Score Of 74; Maurice Dowling Third With 75

Jerry FitzPatrick of the Riverside Golf Club, Saint John, fired a one over par 73 yesterday to lead a field of 164 golfers at the end of the first round of the N. B. P.E.I. Amateur and Open Golf Tournament which is being played at the Charlottetown Golf Course.

Hockey player Bob Gray of Charlottetown finished one stroke behind FitzPatrick to hold runner-up position. Maurice "Mouse" Dowling, formerly of Charlottetown and now of Moncton was third with 75.

FitzPatrick was blazingly hot on the back nine as he came home with a two under par 35. The Saint John business man, who moved to the Maritimes from Montreal three years ago, sank a long putt to birdie the twelfth hole and remained in top form for the finish of his game.

FitzPatrick birdied the fifth, twelfth and sixteenth holes. He had two birdies and seven pars on the last nine and in all he parred eleven holes. He went out in 38 and back in 35.

Big Bob Gray had two birdies as he played a steady game. His shots off the tee were not quite as good as he might have liked but the Winnipeg born athlete was hot with the irons.

Four golfers including the defending champion Pete Kelly were tied for fourth place with scores of 76. The golfers in addition to Kelly were Norman MacLeod of Summerside, R. F. Morrison of Moncton, N. B. and F. Mavor of Edmundston, N. B.

Bill Beer of Charlottetown carded a 77 to hold down fifth place one stroke ahead of club-mates Frank McInnis and Art MacKenzie. T. K. Stewart of St. Croix, N. B., also shot a 78.

Gene McNabb of St. Croix, N. B. showed the way for the professionals as he toured the course with a 75, one stroke better than R. A. Ferris of Bathurst. Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown was third with a 78.

Young Bill Houghton of Restigouche led the junior golfers at the end of the first day's play. Houghton shot an 82. In second place were Errol Nicholson of Charlottetown. Doug Lewis, Moncton and J. Conrad, Saint John with scores of 83.

Harry Simmons of Charlottetown and John Sears of Fredericton each shot an 84 to tie for third position. J. Wolstenholme of Moncton led the second division golfers as he toured the course with a 78. R. Macintosh of Fredericton was second with a 79 while J. Renaud of Saint John and Dick Bagnall of Fredericton each posted an 80.

R. G. Likely of Saint John will take a three stroke lead into today's play for Third Division honors as he posted an 80 yesterday. J. Conrad of Saint John and R. A. Nixon of Moncton each had 83 while three Charlottetown golfers, Dr. J. C. Gallant, Frank Hansen and Irving Praught carded 86's.

Howard MacInnis and Ralph Jenkins of Charlottetown were tied for leadership of the fourth division at the end of yesterday's round with scores of 85. McInnis had now net for the division with a 67.

Charles McArdle of Bathurst shot a 91 to lead the fifth division. Sancton of Saint John was second with 94 while Ivan Horne of Charlottetown and V. O. Johnston of Edmundston were third with 95.

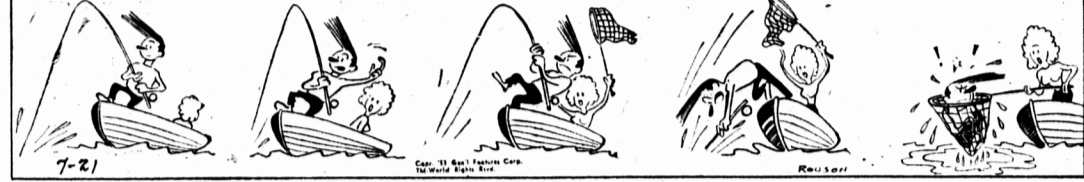

cause Boston Braves beat St. Louis Browns to Milwaukee last March, feels it can get back its lost prestige by grabbing off Los Angeles and San Francisco. All agree that the cities cannot be separated, one going to the National and the other to the American. That would create serious transportation problems.

Would Strengthen League

There is no question that the addition of two such populous cities would strengthen either major league tremendously — at least from an attendance standpoint. Latest census figures show that Los Angeles ranks third in the United States with a population of some 2,000,000 and a drawing power of 4,368,000. San Francisco, including its surrounding Oakland area, has a population of a little over 1,000,000 and drawing power of 2,240,000.

The biggest obstacle in the major's plan to move to California naturally is the Pacific Coast League. The P.C.L. owners will hold a war council within the next two weeks.

"We're going to fight any attempt to take our territory away from us," said league president Clarence Rowland. "I've no doubt Los Angeles and San Francisco are major league cities. But so are the other six. We're all in this thing together. We're working our way toward big league status now and we'll achieve it if they'll let us alone."
