We learn, through the kindness of Mr. Prescott, that the Governor General has not yet arrived at Halifax.

ARCHBISHOP LYNCH celebrated on the 20th inst., the nineteenth anniversary of his consecration.

CYDE shipbuilders threaten a lockout unless the hands yield at once to the reduction in wages.

THE body of Steele, who was killed on the track on Wednesday evening last, was taken to Cardigan last evening.

It is feared that a wide-spread International plot is in existence against the lives of leading European sovereigns.

THE St. Lawrence made a fine trip from Pictou yesterday, arriving at her wharf before six o'clock. This could not be excelled in midsummer.

THE roads throughout the country are now in a most disgraceful condition. They require the immediate attention of the Government.

TWO men named Vreeland and Burke have been committed for trial on a charge of stealing the remains of the late A. T. Stewart.

GREAT distress is prophesied for the coming winter in England and Scotland, on account of the present commercial and financial situation there.

THE Mail advocates the nomination of Hon. Alexander Morris to the Leadership of the Liberal-Conservative Party in the Legislature of Ontario.

A NUMBER of the sidewalks through the City are in a very unsafe condition—being real ankle-breakers.—“An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.”

STR. St. Lawrence left for Pictou at ten minutes past six this morning, taking along a further supply of anxious excursionists, their faces pointing towards Halifax.

THE next trip of the Worcester, due here on Tuesday next, will be her last this season. The Carroll will make the concluding trip of the line the week following.

THE storm drum was ordered yesterday p. m., and we were accordingly visited last night with a furious storm of wind and rain, which lasted until near daylight this morning.

THE new building erected by Mr. Matthew Stevenson, on the corner of Sydney and Queen Streets, is about completed, and is quite an improvement upon the old “corner.”

WE would like to see the lamps which were, owing to the meanness of the Grit Party, removed from before the Post Office, put again in their position. They are very much required.

MARINE DISASTER.—The brigantine “Carmenta,” from England, of and for Summerside, P. E. I., in ballast, is ashore at Sandy Point, Canso. The vessel is insured in Halifax.

SEVERAL dangerous ruts remain unattended to on Water Street, one in front of Longworth & Co's and the other before B. W. Higgs' office. Unless filled up at once, we will, no doubt, have to chronicle a number of accidents.

A STREET crossing is very much required on the north side of Queen Square from Adam Murray's to Market street. Our City Fathers would earn a unanimous vote of thanks from the citizens north of the Post Office if they immediately attend to this very necessary matter.

THE Steam Navigation Company's Wharf is in a very muddy, as well as a most dangerous condition. Several large holes have remained for some time past uncared for, and the wonder is that mortality is not more prevalent amongst our horses. We hope to see an effort made to remedy this state of affairs.

THE Inspector of Licenses is now on his annual tour of inspection. He arrived at Georgetown yesterday, and to-day a number of unlicensed liquor vendors were prosecuted before a J. P. at that place. Some of the offenders were from Cardigan Bridge, and a few prominent members of the Reform Club gave evidence against them.

A LICENSE TO SELL LIQUOR FOR LIFE, GRATIS.—A little riot was organized at Tracadie on Sunday last, in a shanty kept by an old man named Molsaac. One of the parties engaged was seriously hurt. On Thursday warrants were issued against the parties engaged, and also against Molsaac for selling liquor without license. He appeared to answer the charge on Friday before a J. P. at Mount Stewart, and asserted that a neighbor of his was—after having his arm cut off—granted a license to sell liquor for life, gratis, and that neighbor transferred the same license to him, and gave him a gallon of whiskey and told him to commence business.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

THE FISHERY AWARD PAID.

A Draft for \$5,500,000.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

Minister Welsh has paid over to Her Majesty's Government the fisheries award by a draft for \$5,500,000.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21.

The object of the visit of Col. McLeod, to the North-West is for the purpose of reorganizing the Mounted Police on the Australian system.

It is generally admitted that ex-Speaker Anglin had the right to make his recent appointments, but that they are all subject to the approval of the House.

Two contracting firms on the South Eastern Railway have refused to pay the laborers, leaving 200 destitute.

It is rumored that ex-Governor Morris is to run as the Opposition leader in the Ontario Legislature.

The new bridge across the Rideau Canal at Wellington Village has been christened “Lorne” with appropriate civic ceremonies.

The Indians are pulling up the survey stakes in the North-West territories, and the mounted police who went to arrest Big Bear have been sent home empty-handed.

A despatch expresses the fear that an Indian war is likely to become general.

The Saskatchewan “Herald” says this feeling is deep-seated. Great uneasiness prevails amongst the Indians on the plains on account of a real or fancied wrongs.

Ex-Speaker Anglin's recent appointments have occasioned a great deal of adverse criticism.

Mr. Langevin was elected for Three Rivers to-day by acclamation.

A special cable dispatch is published by the Government organ here, to the effect that the Times and Daily News have promised to write down the new fiscal policy of the Government of Canada, and that there will be opposition to the new Canadian loan.

Col. McLeod, of the Northwest Mounted Police, remains here this winter for the reorganization of the whole force.

The stories about Indian troubles in the Northwest are contradicted.

HALIFAX, Nov. 21.

A notorious and expert Boston pickpocket, giving the name of George Ryan, was arrested this afternoon. He had robbed a Bible peddler named H. B. Stearns of a watch. He also tried to rob a lady. He will be sent to the Supreme Court for trial.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.

New and more perfect arrangements were made to-day for the Vice-Royal reception. The reception will be made on the Grand Parade of Jacques Cartier Square.

At the Windsor Hotel a suite of rooms is being fitted up in the most gorgeous style. The dinner service is a costly porcelain, expressly imported for the occasion from Paris. Altogether, Montreal's will be the most brilliant reception given to His Excellency and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.

Hon. Hector Langevin, Postmaster-General, was elected by acclamation for Three Rivers to-day, and left for Halifax.

QUEBEC, Nov. 20.

Prowse Bros., large stove dealers, failed to-day. Liabilities are about \$56,000; assets, \$45,000.

ST. PETER'S, C. B., Nov. 20.

The laborers on the canal are not paid for October work. The pay day should be on the fifteenth of each month. The men stopped work to-day, and will not resume till paid.

Some of the canal officials tell the men that it is the fault of the new Government. Cape Breton laborers and others having last year lost about twenty thousand dollars by the work, are becoming alarmed.

LONDON, Nov. 21.

An order was unexpectedly received at the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich, for nearly 100 tons of camp equipage for the army in South Africa. Stores are being embarked for immediate despatch. The consignment includes a great number of tents, blankets, barrack furniture, utensils and other necessities which were sent out before the commencement of the Caffre campaign.

PARIS, Nov. 21.

De Fourton, in his defence before the Chambers, referred to Gambetta's recent speeches as favouring the ostracism of all who are not old Republicans. Gambetta said, “That is a falsehood.” On demand of the President, M. Grevy, Gambetta said, “I withdraw the words in defence to the rules of the House.” The official account of the meeting, which took place at Plessis Poquet (not Naries Bruyeres) signed by the principals and seconds, says that DeFourton, considering Gambetta's withdrawal did not modify the offensiveness of the epithet requested Deputies Bin, DeBourdon and Robert Mitchell to demand satisfaction. Gambetta named Deputies Allan, Targe and Clemson as his seconds, and refused to make any further withdrawal than that borne on the official minutes. DeFourton won the choice of weapons and named pistols. Both fired at the word and missed. No further particulars.

Dealings are restricted, the prices being rather firmer than at yesterday's closing, which is in consequence of the reduction of the Bank's rate of discount.
