120th Anniversary Of Alberton Presbyterian Church Observed Sunday



Rev. T.H.B. Somers, minister of the Kirk of St. James in Charlottetown, was guest preacher at the Presbyterian Church in Alberton at the concluding service of a series in celebration of the congregation's 120th anniversary. During the past week there were services in the church each evening except Sunday.

The opening service on Monday was conducted by the Minister, Rev. George B. Cunningham B.A. On Tuesday and Wednesday evenings the speaker was Rev. D.A. Campbell of New London, Moderator of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island. On Tuesday his text was "And be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you." (1 Peter 3:15). On Wednesday his message was based on John 7:37 "All that The Father giveth me shall come to me and Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out."

Mr. T.T. Cunningham, student minister at Tyne Valley was the speaker on Thursday evening and also at the preparatory service on Friday. On Thursday Mr. Cunningham sang most effectively "Oh, Prince Budlong (Cudmore)" On Friday Rev. G.B. Cunningham and Mr. T.T. Cunningham sang "I Stand All Amazed." At the preparatory service one new member was received on profession of faith. Sunday morning the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper was observed.

July 20th is a date of great significance to the Presbyterian people of Alberton for on that date one hundred and twenty years ago (1831) their congregation was first organized. At that time it was comprised of fourteen families—those of Alexander Bell, James Clarke, Charles Craswell, John Forsythe, James Forsythe, John Gordon, Robert Gordon, William Hardy, Robert Hardy, James Hardy, John Hewitt, William Warren, James Wells and John Wells. Four years later in 1835, the first session was ordained by Rev. John Keir of Malneque. These first Elders were John Gordon, father of the Eromanga martyrs, Robert Gordon of Alberton, Robert Hardy of Kildare and Charles Craswell of Casumpec. Soon after the ordination of these Elders a church was built near the old Dock Cemetery and here the congregation worshipped for some twenty years. Since there was no resident minister, arrangements were made by which some of the five Presbyterian ministers on the Island at that time would give occasional supply and dispense the church ordinances.

In 1843 Rev. J.C. Sinclair was called and inducted as the regular minister. He was a man of unusual ability and his ministry continued for nine years. During his ministry Benjamin Haswood of Tignish and Archibald McNeil of Kildare were elected as additional members to the Session. It will be recalled that at this period the Alberton Presbyterian Congrega-

tion extended from Tignish to West Cape. The following year, when the inside finishing was nearing completion, the new edifice was completely destroyed by fire of unknown origin. In 1856 the building of another church was begun at the old Dock Church. There are no records to show when it was completed but one may assume it took several years for the finances of the congregation must have been severely strained by the building of two churches in so short a time.

In the annals of the congregation no name is more revered than that of Rev. Allan Fraser who was inducted in 1855 and served the congregation with zeal and devotion until he was promoted to higher service fifteen years later. His widow and four children continued to live in Alberton. Mrs. Fraser has been described as "a gracious influence in the community". Their daughters, Misses Minnie and Christina continued to be respected residents of the Dock and valued members of the church for many years. Their two sons entered the ministry—J.K. Fraser, D.D. and Rev. D.J. Fraser, D.D. who for a period of years was principal of Presbyterian College, Montreal.
