Nixon Wins Far More Cheers Than Boos During Long Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice-President Nixon has won far more cheers than boos during his seven foreign tours as President Eisenhower's goodwill ambassador.

His rock-throwing reception in Peru marks the only serious incident that has bobbed up during his 108,000 miles of travel into 52 countries during the last 4 1/2 years.

Nixon has weathered skirmishes with Communist-led agitators before. In touring Burma, Japan, Australia and the Sudan he met a few "go-home" signs, anti-American demonstrations and pamphlets.

But he never faced anything like the shower of stones, fruit, bread and insults hurled at him by a taunting mob outside San Marcos University in Lima Thursday.

Secret service bodyguards have long feared such trouble — and even worse. Nixon has seemed to be courting danger with his deliberate 27.

INDIFFERENT TO DANGERS

The secret service men's big worry always come when Nixon, as he frequently does, halts the official motorcade which is whisking him to his next stop, gets out and greets the crowd on foot.

Apparently ignoring the risks, Nixon then plows into the dense crowds that often have lined his route, greeting shrieking applauding often near-hysterical spectators.

In Tunis, his four bodyguards, assisted by local police braced themselves in a semi-circle behind him, straining to keep back thousands of excited Tunisians who nearly swallowed him up during his impromptu strolls.

In Rome, Nixon astounded his Italian police escort by weaving through a crowd of some 1,000 well-wishers packed on the sidewalk outside his hotel.

Nixon's informal attitude has been thought out in advance by the vice-president, risky though it may be. His motives are:

1. To dramatize the normal, unpretentious air of Americans generally, thereby winning goodwill for himself and the United States government from amazed spectators more used to seeing foreign visitors speed by in heavily guarded limousines.

The big fear of his bodyguards is that an assassin might someday put a bullet or knife into Nixon's back, or toss a bomb into his path.

2. To demonstrate in spectacular fashion both at home and abroad that he is a man of physical courage as well as an effective goodwill ambassador.

In explaining why he disregarded the advance of many aides to visit the Peruvian university, Nixon said:

"All of us who support the cause of freedom must never show cowardice."
