

Local and Other Items.

SMALL DEBT COURT.—The City Small Debt Court was in session to-day.

RAILWAY PICNICS.—The railway officials picnic takes place at Midgee to-day. The picnic for the mechanical employees will be held at Cape Traverse on Saturday next.

FIGHTING ON THE STREETS.—Two young men engaged in a pugilistic encounter on the corner of Bayfield Street and Malpeque Road at a late hour last night. They will likely figure at the Police Court in a day or two.

THE COAL OUT-PUT.—A Little Glace Bay despatch states that there was shipped from Caledonia mines during the month of July 27,700 tons of coal, probably the largest monthly shipment from one pit ever made in the province.

A COOL COSTUME.—A seaside paper makes the startling announcement that "tan shoes are very much worn this summer. Hundreds of the cottagers wear nothing else." A pair of tan shoes certainly makes a very cool costume.

ROUGH ON CLERGY AND INDIANS.—The Pictou News says: It is told of one of our natives, that decided to go to Halifax cheaply, he passed himself off as a clergyman and obtained half fare, and while there got on a bender and came home half fare as an Indian.

THE BALMORAL CHOIR.—This new American celebrated Scottish Choir may possibly visit our city early in October. Mr. Theo. L. Chappelle is at present negotiating with the manager, and we hope he may be successful in bringing such a talented organization here.

NO "BLUE RUIN" THERE.—The New Glasgow Enterprise gives a lengthy account of the building operations in Pictou county, and estimates that over \$300,000 is being spent this year. \$100,000 in New Glasgow (which includes \$50,000 for streets), \$70,000 in Westville, \$35,000 in Pictou, \$95,000 in Trenton, and \$20,000 in Stellarton. \$100,000 is also being spent in Truro.

BIG SALE OF ICE CREAM.—It takes a good deal to cool off New York on a hot day. On the 4th of July one ice cream manufacturer sold 50,000 quarts of cream. It is said that the profit on this was \$7,500. A popular pharmacy sold 21 gallons of lemonade alone from its soda fountain one hot day recently. THE RIFLE.—A most enjoyable and successful day was spent on Kensington range on Monday last by No. 1 Battery, G. A. The Battery was represented by 38 men and 3 officers. The shooting was a good average, considering a rear fiftail wind and many of the men having no practice. Corp. Murley heads the list with 68 points, with Captain Davison a good second with 65, (possible 80). The prizes will be presented at the Drill Shed this evening.

DYNAMITE IN NOVA SCOTIA.—Warrants have been issued against three young men named Murphy, Conrod and Sellers, who are charged with a very serious crime. A few days ago a quantity of powder and dynamite were placed under a house owned by Henry Stewall, of Lawrencetown, N. S., with the view evidently of destroying the house. The explosion did serious damage to the house, rendering it completely useless for habitation.

He was afterwards arrested for being drunk, and a watch was found in his possession which Bradley identified as the one stolen from him. In court this morning Rice at first pleaded not guilty to the charge of stealing the watch, but afterwards owned up to the theft.

A Cyclone in New Brunswick.

St. LEONARDS, N. B., Aug. 5.

About 4.30 yesterday afternoon a heavy thunder and hail storm, accompanied by a cyclone, did considerable damage in the parish of St. Anns, Madawaska County. The cyclone covered a territory of about two miles in width, travelling from east to west, blowing down 31 buildings, as far as heard from. No deaths are reported. The damage to crops was very heavy, the hail in some instances cutting them level with the ground.

The Burchall Case.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Aug. 5.

A cablegram has been received from G. T. Blackstock, Brighton, England, signifying his intention of accepting the retainer for the defence in the Burchall case. Besides Blackstock, Hellmuth and Ives, of London, Finkle, McKay and McMullen, a leading local law firm, have been retained for the defence. Detective Bluet, of Toronto, who is also watching the case for the defence, is in town, and will remain until after the trial.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.

A. Lesueur leaves for Halifax shortly to conduct the promotion examination in the excise service, which will be held Aug. 26th. The live stock shipments from Montreal for July amounted to 17,339 cattle and 18,243 sheep, the largest number yet shipped in one month.

Fever on Board.

BOSTON, Aug. 5.

The steamer Samaria, from Colon, arrived this morning, and is detained at quarantine. One man died on Sunday last of coast fever and was buried at sea. Several others have been ill with the same complaint.

The Mormons Defeated.

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 5.

The election yesterday resulted in large Liberal majorities. The Mormons are badly broken up at this result, which means their everlasting defeat as a body.

Boys Killed.

MONTREAL, Aug. 5.

While four little boys were racing to-day with a St. Denis street car, two named Charland and Morrisette fell under the car and were killed.
