

Federal Policy On Ownership Is Questioned

TORONTO (CP) — A. J. Little, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, said here he questions the value of a federal policy which channels Canadian capital into a minority position in foreign-owned companies that meet the tests of Canadian ownership.

Mr. Little was referring to Prime Minister Gordon's budget legislation that offers a reduction in withholding tax on dividends going abroad to firms which have sufficient holdings in Canada to pass Canadian ownership requirements.

He asked in a speech to the Canadian Club here whether, at a time when Canada needs capital for expansion and modernization of existing facilities, "are we wise to direct our capital into already existing foreign-controlled facilities?"

He said these foreign companies have been commended for making shares available to Canadians. But in many cases, the sale of a minority interest to Canadians would represent shares previously owned abroad resulting in a direct export of the capital involved.

He also repeated a recent call to the government to assess carefully its expenditures on welfare in relation to Canada's capacity to pay for them.

He said it is not too much to ask the government to pause to consider priorities before proceeding further down the welfare road.

Chippewa Indian TV Art Director

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Bill Shilling says he likes to be an individualist and he should have no difficulty fulfilling his desire here. As far as he knows, he's the only Indian on the Avalon Peninsula.

A sneaky six-foot-four Chippewa, he was born in 1941 on a reservation at Raa, 100 miles north of Toronto, but left home at 17 and hasn't looked back. He arrived here in June and is working as art director for a television station.

The last known of Newfoundland's native Beothic Indians died in 1829, and although there are Micmacs living in several west coast settlements, Bill Shilling is the only Indian known to be living in this part of the island.

The distinction sometimes results in good-natured ribbing from friends and fellow employees but his sense of humor helps him smooth it off. And he just smiles when an impish and no-nonsense introduced him as the last of the Mohicans.

Mr. Shilling says he has never encountered any form of discrimination and as a result sometimes forgets he's an Indian. He recalls a visit to a Toronto night spot where he heard someone whisper, "Look, there's an Indian." He found himself looking around, too. "I never realized they were talking about me."

DROVE TRUCK

His 15 years since leaving the reservation have been dedicated to developing his non-conformist personality. He is a talented artist but has also worked at such jobs as driving a truck, picking tobacco and strawberries, selling magazines and instructing in a YMCA camp.

He says he doesn't know his family's correct name, explaining that his grandfather adopted the name Shilling because that was the amount of money he was paid by the British for some furs.

"It was the only English word he knew so they began calling him Shilling. It stuck."

Bill Shilling feels seriousness when he tries to recall the name of "one of those little huts

made of crossed sticks and hides" that he says his great-grandfather lived in as a child. Although he feels free-lancing is the ideal mode of employment, he has gradually stuck to steady work for the last few years. Before coming here Mr. Shilling worked as a junior artist for a Toronto firm and then as a designer for a film company. He considers himself a graphic artist but finds most of his work here involves pure art for advertisements.

When not drawing ads for the station or working out plans for a "ricky little gadget" to be used as a Christmas decoration, he does bit parts in TV commercials for a local brewery. "Life is meant to be lived as we see fit," he says, "and I don't intend to miss a minute of it."

And he brushes off good-natured ribbing from friends and fellow employees but his sense of humor helps him smooth it off. And he just smiles when an impish and no-nonsense introduced him as the last of the Mohicans.

The Russians pressed for the showdown meeting on the Sino-Soviet dispute in a communication published after talks with visiting Austrian Communist leaders.

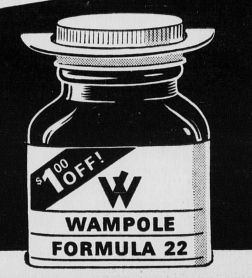

The new Soviet leaders have reaffirmed their intention of preparing for a world meeting but this was the first time they mentioned the preparatory conference.

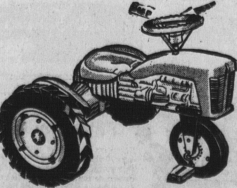
