miers, tabled Wednesday in the Commons, he proposed that a federal-provincial body of experts meet early next month to clarify the technical details.

His tax formula is linked with equalization payments to increase revenue of the less wealthy provinces, including Quebec, to the average per capita levels of the wealthier ones—Ontario and British Columbia. It includes double-barrelled minimum payment guarantees.

These provide that no province will get less in the first year of the new five-year arrangement, proposed to start April 1, 1957, than it will receive in the final year of the tax rental agreements.

They also guarantee that no province would in the 1958-59 fiscal year get less than 90 per cent of what it obtained in 1957-58. In subsequent years the guarantee would be for 90 per cent of average receipts in the previous two years.

COULD AFFECT BUDGET

Just how the new formula would work out for each province was not immediately clear. Finance Minister Harris proposed to meet with reporters today to discuss the formula.

For the two central provinces of Ontario and Quebec it appeared the corporation tax concession might net them an additional \$1,000,000 or so apiece based on 1954 returns and much higher amounts based on 1955 incomes.

But a qualification in equalization payments might reduce the \$4,000,000 previously estimated for Quebec. In provinces which collect direct taxes, the federal government would allow an expense deduction from corporation assessments any special provincial taxes totalling more than nine per cent of the corporation's taxable income or to more than the province's general corporation income tax.

This expense allowance then would be deducted from the federal equalization payment to the province. In the case of Quebec, officials estimated the equalization payment may thus be reduced by between \$3,000,000 and \$5,000,000.
