Unemployment Claims Down In Souris And Montague

Officials of the National Employment Office opened a temporary office in Souris on Monday for the purpose of taking unemployment insurance claims. A similar office was opened in Montague yesterday.

The Souris office, in the two days ending last night had taken approximately 170 claims, which is somewhat below expectations. The number of claims filed at Montague for the 24 hour period ending last night was 40, and this too was well below the total expected.

However, road conditions have not been very good and it is expected that in the next couple of days many more claims will be received.

In spite of the fact that claims were being taken at Souris and at Montague some claimants are still filing their claims by mail, evidently in the belief that they will save time and receive quicker payment.

Unfortunately many of the claims which are received by mail are incorrectly completed and must be returned to the claimant for correction. On the other hand, claims taken person to person forestall errors and will in most cases bring quicker results than those filed by mail.

The Souris office will remain open until Thursday evening if necessary and the Montague office will remain open until Friday evening if the volume of work justifies it.

Both offices should attract claimants from wide areas and were opened in the belief that they would be a convenience to a large number of people.

Admits Killing Wife, Daughter

GORHAM, Me. (AP)—A jobless carpenter told police he hammered to death his totally deaf wife and crippled daughter early Tuesday because he "couldn't stand the pressure."

Russell Wolcott Moses, 65, tried only a few hours after the deaths of his wife, Lulu, about 55, and daughter Frances, 36 — to plead guilty to murdering them.

But Judge Sidney W. Wernick of Portland's municipal court wouldn't accept the plea and ordered one of not guilty entered. Wernick said there were indications that Moses was incapable of understanding the seriousness of the charges.

Moses was held without bail for the January term of superior court. Wernick set that time, he said, so the man could be committed to a mental hospital for observation.
