Death Of Mrs. R. J. Rupert Occurs Suddenly At Age 57

The death of Mrs. R. J. Rupert occurred suddenly at the Charlottetown Hospital, Monday, Dec. 14 in her 57th year.

Mrs. Rupert, the former Imogene Prime, was the wife of Ralph J. Rupert and with her husband moved to Charlottetown in 1936.

She was born in Lancaster, N.B. the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward Prime. Although of a quiet and retiring disposition Mrs. Rupert had been active in former years in the work of the First Baptist Church in Charlottetown serving as president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, the Director of a Group and chairman of the Music Committee.

She had also been active in the Alpha Ys Menettes of the YMCA.

Mrs. Rupert is survived by her husband and three daughters: Barbara (Mrs. Douglas Cameron) of Charlottetown; Janet (Mrs. William Townsend) of New Market, Ont. and Diane, a registered nurse with the Victoria Order of Nurses at Oak Bay, N.S.

Open Restaurant Case, Ten Witnesses Heard

Ten witnesses were called yesterday in City Court when the case of John Henry Reid appeared before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, GC.

Mr. Reid is charged with operating a restaurant without a license, and he was remanded until Dec. 22.

First witnesses were for the crown. John Butler, city comptroller, who produced a document he had received from the mayor ordering the licence that had been issued to Reid's Fish and Chips in September of this year to be revoked due to findings of the chief public health officer on the island. He also identified a copy of a letter sent by himself through Corporal Keith Wakelin to Johnny's Fish and Chips ordering the restaurant closed for health reasons. Corporal Wakelin later identified the letter as a copy of the one he had served to the accused, John Henry Reid, on Nov. 20.

OPEN AND OPERATING

Sergeant Charles Ready of the Charlottetown police force testified that he had been in the restaurant in question twice on the date of Nov. 21 and that the restaurant was open and operating. The accused on that date told him that the restaurant was open because he wanted to take the case to court.

Sergeant Ready also stated that he had received a document from Gordon Holmes at the Levy Courts building, stating that John Henry Reid was the owner of a restaurant under the name of Johnny's Fish and Chips.

Dr. Wendall Macdonald, medical health officer for the City of Charlottetown stated that the accused had been noted in June that there were irregularities in his restaurant and was asked to clean it up. He stated that he went to Johnny's Fish and Chips on Nov. 21 and told Johnny that if he didn't close the restaurant he would hear about it.

Dr. Macdonald said, "If there is to be nothing done about this there is no point in me being city health officer."

COUNSEL OBJECTS
He wished to read a letter he had received from the Health Department concerning Johnny's Fish and Chips but Mr. Gillis, counsel for the accused, raised an objection to this statement, that if anyone was read that letter it would be the person who wrote it.

Dr. Macdonald said "Then

I'm wasting my time as well as that of the other people in this court."

Allison Gillis called six employees. Clyde Bell, an employee of Central Creameries, stated that in doing business at the restaurant he had always dealt with the girls on duty and a few times it was Betty Reid. He had noticed no change in the regular way of carrying on his dealings.

Ron Whittlock, employee of Mother's Own Bread, testified that he usually did business with the girls on duty and a few times with Betty Reid but had never done business with the accused.

Fires Doused At Parkdale

The Parkdale Fire Department was called out shortly after 4:30 yesterday afternoon to extinguish a fire burning in two garages on Palmers Lane. One of the garages, owned by Merrill Nicholson of 9 Palmer's Lane, was a total loss, was partially damaged.

The Fire Department answered the call with three pumps. There was a car in the Roberts garage which they pulled out before it was damaged. A fire threatened both houses at one point but was not caught or damaged them in any way.

The cause of the blaze is unknown.
