Colonial Chicken Pie Headlines Festivities

Dover, Delaware, dates proudly back to Colonial days. Its gracious homes with their quaint outside "cookhouses" reflect a very different type of cookery from that we enjoy today.

Brown lightly in corn oil. Cool. To Pat Together: Oil a 2 1/2-15. In shallow baking dish; roll out 2-3 of pastry 1/4-inch thick and line dish. Dust with 2 tsp. bread crumbs and press in.

When a woman baked a chicken pie in the ancient brick oven it was a production. And she did it the hard way, often with tough, undependable barnyard chickens.

In dish arrange chicken sections and 1/4 c. diced scalded lean bacon.

BUSTLING ACTIVITY

The Terry garden and brick cookhouse yards away from the main dwelling were the scene of bustling activity the day of our visit when a big succulent chicken pie came out of the oven.

Pour in 1 c. cold broth or water with 2 crushed bouillon cubes. Cover with remaining rolled pastry.

Electricians adjusting cables for TV; tape recorders to describe the event for radio; cameramen alert to shoot even the savory steam from the pie, were awaiting the moment when Colonial-gowned Mrs. Oliver W. Farrow, Jr., cut the first piece.

The pastry (adapted); make a double recipe for baking powder biscuit dough, using a mix and water for liquid.

Serve hot, the whole yolk of a hard-cooked egg in hollow of each artichoke bottom.
Spoon over 1 tsp. melted butter; arrange on round platter, spear of cooked asparagus or broccoli radiating between.

Roll 1/2-inch thick on floured surface.
Spread almost to edge with 2 tsp. room-soft butter. Fold over. Press edges together.

The Chef's Sauce Ravigote
This classic sauce derives its name from the French verb ravigoter, which means to revive, or in this case "whet the appetite."
Sauce Ravigote for fish fillets, shellfish or tomatoes: Combine 2 tsp. mild vinegar, 3 tsp. olive oil, 1 tsp. minced onion, 1/2 tsp. mustard (preferably Dijon), 1 drop liquid garlic, 1 fine-chopped hard-cooked egg, 1 tsp. each chopped parsley, tarragon and chervil, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. black pepper.

Roll out, spread on two more tsp. softened butter; fold over and roll again. Chill.

This is nice for lunch or supper.

The filling: Rinse 2 (2 1/2 lbs.) sectioned Delmarva broiler-fryer chickens. Drain thoroughly.
