Principal speaker at the convention was Mr. Ross Woodman of the University of Western Ontario, London.

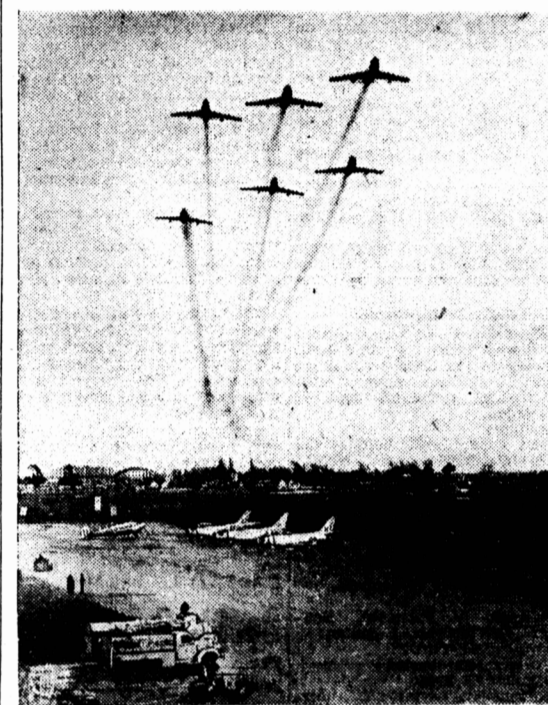

Big Improvement Seen In Local Employment Picture

The number of seasonally employed people is dwindling rapidly. Officials of the local branch of the National Employment Office say that already signs are apparent that the labor supply will hardly meet the demand this summer.

At the peak of seasonal unemployment about 1600 were drawing insurance benefits in King's and Queen's Counties. The figure now stands at roughly seven hundred.

Many men are being absorbed by building contractors; others have been rehired to work on Dominion Government boats and dredges; the Provincial Government has put several crews to work repairing highways, and along the whole labor front activity is flaring.

Moderator Preaches In The Kirk

The Right Reverend Norman D. Kennedy, M.C., M.A., D.D., Minister of First Church, Regina, and Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was guest of honor and special preacher at Divine Service in the Kirk of St. James yesterday morning.

In greeting the congregation in the name of the General Assembly the Moderator spoke of the unique place occupied by the Kirk in the Presbyterian Church in the Maritime Provinces and commended the congregation for their traditions in worship and service maintained for so many generations.

The Moderator drew attention to the new position occupied by Canada in world affairs and to the opportunities awaiting the Canadian people within the confines of their own land. He stated that the Presbyterian Church in Canada was now in a better position than ever to make its unique contribution in worship, doctrine and service to the whole Church of Christ and reminded the congregation of the way in which Presbyterianism had built up some of the finest institutions of democracy and freedom-loving peoples.
