The amount of gold in circulation in the United States is estimated at \$300,000,000, while about \$160,000,000 is held by the national treasury and the banks. The London Statist anticipates that Europe will have to export large sums of gold to America this year, in which event this very amount now held by the United States will be further increased. The New York Herald thinks the country has now more gold in circulation than it requires.

THERE were over four thousand candidates at the recent Educational Examinations in Ontario. The candidates are divided into first class, (professional and non-professional), intermediate, third class (non-professional), and second class (non-professional), grades A and B. The number of candidates increases yearly, and this year the reading of the answers required the labor of fifty-five examiners for nearly three weeks.

THE MISSING STEAMER LUDWIG.—The missing steamer Ludwig has now been out so long over her time that anxiety has given place to despair. The steamer's cargo consists of glass, hardware and iron, among the latter being three hundred iron beams for the parliament houses in Quebec. She has on board in all about 250,000 packages, together with 144 head of cattle. The Ludwig's cargo is valued at about \$200,000, and the ship \$300,000. Total half a million. The ship is fully insured in Antwerp; and the cargo is variously insured. She also had a number of passengers.—[The Chronicle.]

THERE was a heavy rain storm at Sackville on Tuesday morning. In the midst of it there was a brilliant flash of lightning, closely followed by an appalling peal of thunder. This was the whole of the thunderstorm, but there was enough to render it memorable. The chimney of the Brunswick House was struck, and the building set on fire. The hotel was completely burnt, and it was with much difficulty that the adjacent stores and dwellings were saved. There was insurance to the amount of \$3,500, yet the loss of the proprietor, Mr. Estabrooks, is very severe. He intends, however, to rebuild.

Mr. Wilde's business, at present, is to superintend the rehearsal and pre-entation of his play, "Vera," which will be brought out for the first time, at Union Square Theatre, on Monday evening next. The aesthetic dramatist is said to have been the life of the ship's crew during the passage, and to have entertained the ladies with readings from his own poems. It is not said whether or not Oscar was a second time disappointed with the Atlantic. Good.

Uncasiness in Ischia.

LONDON, Aug. 16. There are alarming symptoms of earthquake in Senara, Island of Ischia. The springs are drying up, and smoke is issuing from fissures in the ground. The minister of public works has issued an order for huts for the people, in case they are compelled to leave their homes.

The Pope has requested Cardinal McCabe, Archbishop of Dublin, to summon a chapter of his diocese to nominate a coadjutor who shall become Archbishop on Cardinal McCabe's death.

The German Government has notified the Austrian Government that all pig flesh imported to Germany from Austria must be accompanied by a certificate that it is not American meat.

An Italian newspaper gravely announces, says an exchange, that Mr. Stanley, the African explorer, has accepted the title of king at the hands of the savage tribes among whom he is laboring in the interest of Commerce. He is to be styled, it adds, King Stanley of Congo, and is to be invested with absolute authority to sign treaties and to exercise all the other functions of supreme sovereignty. When Mr. Stanley is in possession of his kingdom, he and M. de Lessops will be in a position to counterdiligently dictate terms to all the other monarchs of the world.

There was a long debate, characterized by much obstruction on the part of the Irish members, in the House of Commons, on the 14th, on the vote for legal expenses incurred in the recent criminal prosecutions in Ireland. Harrington, member for Westmeath, alleged that Myles Joyce was judicially murdered. Callan, member for Louth, declared that the Government could have brought the Phoenix Park murderers to justice without the evidence of James Carey; but that Mr. William Harcourt contrived to have Carey accepted as an informer for the purpose of endeavoring to connect some of the Irish members of Parliament with the murders. Parnell repeated the charges of jury packing in Ireland, and of the reckless desire of the Government to procure convictions for the purpose of striking terror among the people of that country. Porter, Attorney-General for Ireland, said that as long as atrocities in Ireland went unpunished, the means of inquiry allowed by law would be used without shrinking. Parnell moved that the amount of money provided for in the appropriation be reduced, but the motion was defeated by twenty-four yeas to ninety-four nays.

Caledonia Day.

The weather is fine, and everything points to a most successful Gathering of the Clans. Excursionists from all parts of the province, and from Nova Scotia, have arrived to attend the National Gathering. There were one hundred and twenty-six on the boat from Pictou last evening, besides about 25 regular passengers. Among them were Mr. T. C. Hensay, of the International Steamship Co.; John Ross, of the Pictou; the American Consul of the port of Pictou; and Dr. K. McKenzie, of Belfast, P. E. I., who has been in Edinburgh for some time, and intends pending a few weeks among his people. The trains from Georgetown and Souris under Conductor Scott, brought eight cars uncomfortably filled with excursionists; the train from Tignish, under Conductor Thompson, brought ten cars filled almost to suffocation; and the train from Summerside, under Conductor McGowan, brought eight cars overcrowded with passengers. It is estimated that the number of people who arrived by these trains exceeded two thousand. The steamer "Heather Belle" arrived from Orwell with all the excursionists she could carry, while the steamer "Southport" brought a very large number indeed. At ten o'clock the members of the Caledonian Club met at the Rooms, Lower Queen Street, clad in tartan. They formed into procession, and marched to the grounds, to the martial music of the bagpipes. The games, on arrival of the Club, were commenced, and will continue until seven this evening. The number in attendance is the largest since the Club was organized.

Terrible Tragedy.

The steamer "Eureka," which arrived at Victoria, B. C., on the 13th, brings news of a horrible tragedy at Dakan, near Harrisburg, Alaska. Two whiskey sellers named Rennie and Martin, got on a drunk, and unceremoniously exchanged cabars. During the night the Indians broke into Martin's cabin where Rennie was sleeping and stole a bottle of whiskey. Soon the fact was discovered and both started in pursuit of the Indians, and in a fight which ensued Rennie was killed. The citizens in force, arrested three Indians, confining them in a guard house. During the absence of the guard they procured a pistol, shooting him on return, and then fled. The firing awoke Mayor Givens, formerly of the United States Army. He rushed to the rescue, and was shot down and wounded. The Indians took an axe and hacked his head to pieces. The three Indians then attempted to make good their escape, but a number of miners who had remained the scene shot one of them dead and arrested a second, and the third escaped. The infuriated citizens constituted themselves a jury and hanged the captured Indian the next day. Col. Barry ordered the chiefs to produce the third, who had escaped, and he was quickly delivered up and as promptly hanged.
