INGLEWOOD, Calif., July 26—(AP)—Trainer Jimmy Jones announced today that Citation, the first and only \$1,000,000 winner in horse racing, has run his last race.

"We just feel this is the time when he is at the peak of his fame, to retire him," Jones said. "He has reached his goal."

The "goal" was the \$1,000,000 mark, which he reached and passed in winning the Hollywood Gold Cup last Saturday. The triumph boosted the turf's already-all-time-high winner's earnings to \$1,085,780.
