Wet Weather Delays Harvesting in West

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 18 — During the past week, weather has been much cooler throughout the Prairie Provinces and good rains have been fairly general. Heaviest precipitation was in the Red River Valley where 2 1/2 inches was recorded. All harvesting operations, which have commenced in Southern Manitoba, will be delayed for about a week due to the recent wet weather. The immediate requirement is warm sunny weather to hasten maturity of crops in the most northern areas and throughout Alberta according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways. Prospects still continue good in the Peace River district but here again hot weather is required as the crops are quite late. Grain is filling well and some crops are beginning to turn with the odd

field of barley already having been cut. In the Okanagan, weather continued hot and dry. Peaches are now moving in full volume and the plum movement is about finished. Bartlett pears are commencing to move and are a little smaller in size than usual.

the dummy — and if the lower cards in the trump suit are changed slightly, this is the proper procedure. When, however, declarer misses the jack and ten and two other trumps, it is the height of carelessness to lead anything but the single honor (the ace in this case) first! Observe: if it had been East who held all four trumps, no maneuver by South could have shut him out; but on the pass-

ability that West has all of these missing trumps, the aceplay is not to discover the fact so that you can take passive finesses can be taken through the jack and ten up to dummy's higher cards. Obviously, if the missing four trumps break 2-2 or 3-1, it doesn't matter how declarer plays.
