Royal Treasurer Had Remarkable Army Career

General Sir Frederick Browning, K.C.V.O., R.E., C.B., D.S.O., is treasurer to His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh. It was in 1948 that Lt. General Sir Frederick Browning entered the service of the Royal Family, being appointed Comptroller and Treasurer of the Household of The Princess Elizabeth. After Her Majesty's accession to the throne he was appointed Treasurer to The Duke of Edinburgh.

The General has had a distinguished career in the Army, and during the second world war played the leading part in the development of British airborne forces. He is also a famous athlete. He was one of Britain's leading hurdlers in the twenties; he represented both England and the Army in the High Hurdles and was picked for the 1924 Olympic Games. He broke his leg during the Winter Games of 1924, and was unable to compete. He represented Great Britain in the 1928 Olympic Games. In 1948 he was Commandant, a position equivalent to non-commissioned captain in the Army. He has been in all-round athlete, who has jumped at the Horse Show for King, George V cup and a keen amateur yachtsman. He is member of the Royal Yacht Squadron and is Commodore of the Royal Yacht Club and the Household Brigade Yacht Club. He has been for many years a vice-president of the British Yacht Association and is Deputy Chairman of the British Yacht Association.

Frederick Arthur Montague Browning was born on 20th December 1886. He was educated at Eton and at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, where he was first world war. He was gazetted to the Grenadier Guards in 1915 and served in France with the Western Front, winning medals in despatches, the Cross de Guerre and the D.S.O.

Between wars he served at home and overseas, was Adjutant of the 1st Battalion of the Grenadier Guards, 1924-28, and in 1936, commanding the 2nd battalion of the Grenadier Guards.
