Minor's Week Starts Today

Today is the opening of Minor Hockey Week all across Canada and officials of the Charlottetown branch of the program are hard at work in preparation for the week's activity on the local scene.

We had a chat with Ivan Doherty, president of the Charlottetown minor program and young Jack Kipping, who has been appointed honorary president of the league for the week, yesterday. Jack is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eric Kipping, Newland Crescent, Charlottetown and he is a member of the Bisons hockey team in the PeeWee division.

We asked Mr. Doherty how Jack had come to be granted the honor of his position and Ivan told us he was selected as he is considered to be a good example of the type of youth the program strives to produce.

When we questioned Jack as to how he felt about taking over Mr. Doherty's position for the week the youngster replied: "I am glad to have the honor to represent all the kids in the minor hockey program." Young Kipping expressed his feeling of league play, and we went right after Brian Lewis, referee in chief for the minor system, as Jack said: "The teams are well balanced in the league (PeeWee) but sometimes there is a little dirty hockey by the players."

Due to his father's business Kipping wasn't able to play in an organized hockey league until two years ago and when we asked him how he felt about the local set-up, he replied: "I think it is great that the teams are all so even and you play against a great many youngsters and thus it never gets boring, as I don't get hurt." Jack has a seven year old brother who is playing in the pee-wee division.

Mr. Doherty told us that along with the Minor Hockey Night activities there will be several of the teams from the respective divisions travelling through the rural areas to engage in contests with teams from the respective rural centres.

Ivan said that he would like to say, "It is a great honor to be associated with the more than 60 volunteer minor hockey workers and I hope that the local system will always maintain its present prestige and prosper with recreation for our youth as its prime interest." The league president said there has been a vast improvement in parent interest and in fan interest in general in the local minor contests.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish Mr. Doherty and Master Kipping and all the members of the Charlottetown system the best of luck in the future and congratulate them for what they have already contributed towards healthful recreation for the youth of Charlottetown.

This game will be the first meeting of these same two teams who ended the 1953-54 season in first place, although UNB won the championship on a technicality.

Both teams are evenly balanced and support good scoring punch, good defense, and lots of depth. Also, both teams are undefeated to date. Thus the game has held top priority in sports circles around Charlottetown this past week.

Coach Kane says that he plans on no special strategy against Kelly's forces, except to reinstate George MacMillan at centre between Gordie Whitlock and George Monaghan.
