ISLAND STEAMERS.—There was no steamer from Picton last evening, owing to unfavorable weather. The Northumberland crossed over from Point du Chene in good time however, and the mails arrived here shortly after seven o'clock.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.—Mr. G. Frank Beer read an interesting paper before the Epworth League last evening on the important subject of Labor and Capital. A lively discussion followed. Some points referred to are further discussed in our editorial column.

SCOTT ACT CONVICTIONS.—Twenty Scott Act convictions were made in Woodstock on Saturday, four of which are for third offences and will result in the imprisonment of the convicted persons. As this rate in Charlotte county jail will soon have to be enlarged.

INVESTIGATION.—His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate will investigate the charge preferred against Officer Warren by Theo. L. Chappell on Thursday forenoon at eleven o'clock. Seven witnesses have been summoned for the prosecution; for the defence, five or six.

TYPE SETTING.—The Toronto News has put in type setting machines, the Montreal Star is putting in 30, and the Ottawa Citizen has a printer in its office, being all run by machines, and the ads set up in a job office. The printing business is on the eve of a great revolution.

THE WOMAN VICTIM.—A row at Chatham the other night ended in the breaking of windows. A policeman went to arrest the fair and gentle maiden who was charged with the breaking of the glass, and she stood him off with an axe, saying he might drag out her dead body but he couldn't take her alive. The policeman retired in good order.

A CURIOSITY.—There was an exhibition at Taylor & Craig's store at Freetown, a few days ago, a curiosity in the shape of a mouse which had got into a bottle when young, and, evidently, having enough food in the bottle, remained there until it had grown too large to get out again. The mouse is now a prisoner, but seems perfectly contented in his new home.

B. K. L.—R. G. Magee, Esq., and two other delegates, of St. John's, N. J., will arrive here Thursday evening, Nov. 24th, to establish a Preceptory of the Royal Black Knights of Ireland. THE MARKETS.—The market to-day was very small, with not much change in prices. Eggs brought 20 cents per dozen, and very scarce at that price. Butter was in normal supply at 90 cents per lb. Hay sold at from 55 to 60 cents per 100 lbs. Beef, per carcass, sold at from 4 to 6 cents per lb., with the supply fair, but the demand small. No change in other articles.

ANOTHER INSURANCE FUND.—The Montreal Street Railway Company have decided to set aside a monthly sinking fund to be known as the Insurance fund. Out of this all damages for accidents, Nov. 24th, of the year any surplus remaining will be divided amongst those motor men and the street car drivers who have run the greatest number of miles without accident or damage to passengers or cars.

HEARTLESS CRUELTY.—A story of heartless cruelty comes from Calgary. Dr. Lovingheart has a number of men hauling coal from Kneehill mines. The round trip occupied 36 days and sufficient food was not sent with the men. The result was that the rations ran out. A man named Boyce became exhausted, and lagged behind the rest. The men had lived on oats and occasionally game. Boyce at last fell down on the trail and was found next morning dead. There is much indignation against Lovingheart.

DEAD BODY FOUND.—The body of an Indian belonging to Badro, Westmoreland Co., was found in the woods at Albert Mines one day last week. He had been out hunting and when found his gun was by his side and a little dog that followed him was found in a half-starved, famishing condition, having loitered by the decomposed remains of his master. Some of the Indian's comrades, when they heard of the affair, came across from Badro and took the remains home for burial.—Moncton Times.

ANOTHER BREAK.—A remarkable freak of nature has occurred at the farm of Mr. Doody Rickh, who lives at Pedenham, W. Co., N. B. An apple tree, set out by Mr. Richard last spring, has grown three crops of apples, the third and last yield being still on the tree and looking healthier than either of the former lots. The tree was set out in May and blossomed and brought forth fruit. The apples grew to the size of birds' eggs and were blown off sometime in June. In July the tree again blossomed and this time grew apples a size larger than the June crop. The third and last attempt to grow a good-sized hardy apple has been made by the tree. It blossomed in September and the product is still to be seen on the tree.
