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Upset Seen In Rich Race

NEW YORK (AP) — Darby Dan Farm's Bramalea won the \$10,125 Coaching Club American Oaks at Belmont Park Saturday, beating heavy-favored Cicada by a half-length.

The upset before 38,122 horse racing fans thwarted the triple crown bid of Cicada, the queen of the three-year-old fillies who had reigned supreme over horses of her own age for 1 1/2 years.

Cicada, from C. J. Cheney's Meadow Stable, was a 9-to-20 favorite to add the 1 1/4-mile Oaks to her victories in the Acorn and the Mother Goose stakes which made up the first two parts of the rich filly triple.

The greatest money-winning filly in racing history, had all she could do, in fact, to save second money by a nose over E. Barry Ryan's Firm Policy in the final mile.

E. P. Taylor's Flower Page, who won the Queen's Plate last Saturday in Toronto, finished fourth, two lengths behind Firm Policy.

Josey Gonzalez Beats Archer

NEW YORK (AP) — Josey Gonzalez, a whirling dervish puncher from Puerto Rico, handed Joey Archer his first loss in 31 bouts by winning a split, 10-round decision over the New York middleweight Saturday night in Madison Square Garden. Gonzalez wretched 157-138, Archer 132.

Both judges, Leo Birbaum and Frank Forbes, had Gonzalez the winner, six rounds to four. Referee Jimmy Devlin had Archer winning, 6-4. The Associated Press had Gonzalez ahead, 6-5-1.

There were no knockdowns, but in the final split plenty of blood had been spilled around the ring — most of it by Archer. He started bleeding from the nose in the first round. Cuts opened over both his eyes.

In the final round, Archer opened a gash over Gonzalez' left eye, and blood poured out. Archer's cuts required six stitches near each eye.

Johnson Retains Boxing Crown

BERLIN (AP) — Harold Johnson retained his world light heavyweight championship Saturday night by outpointing West Germany's Gustav Scholtz in a 15-rounder.

Johnson dominated the German almost throughout the fight. There were no knockdowns.

The bout was staged in the open-air Olympia Stadium before 35,000 persons. Johnson weighed 172 1/2 pounds; Scholtz 171.

German sports writers unanimously agreed with the verdict in his favor.

Fine Is Doubled For Driver Charged On Second Offence

Lorne William Clinton, Charlottetown, pleading guilty to driving while his license was a suspended, was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days in jail by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court Saturday.

The magistrate doubled the fine after it had been revealed by Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur, that the accused has a previous conviction in the same court for a similar offence earlier in 1962.
