St. John's, N. F., Nov. 12. An important election took place at Bonavista on Saturday in which the question of confederation with Canada was a factor.

Peter Howe, senior member of the banking firm of Howe & Son, and his wife, respectively 73 and 69 years old, were brutally beaten to death with a car coupling pin last night by Charles Burkhardt, a desperate fellow, who, later on, cut his own throat with a razor and died inside of five minutes.

General Warren Resigns. LONDON, Nov. 12. In the Commons this afternoon, Mr. Matthews, Home Secretary, announced the resignation of Gen. Warren, as Chief of the Metropolitan Police.

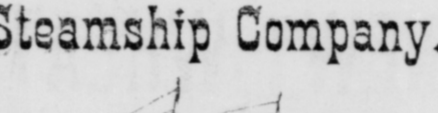
