SCOTT ACT.—Another offender "went down" for two months this morning.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court meets at Summerside on Tuesday next.

DRAMATIC READINGS.—Mrs. Scott Siddons is to give a series of dramatic readings in Summerside on the evening of the 25th inst.

PRICE OF SUGAR.—The price of sugar has been raised one eighth of a cent per pound, instead of one half a cent as stated yesterday.

I. O. O. F.—The interior of the Oddfellows' Hall is being cleaned and beautified prior to the session of the Grand Lodge in August next.

THE JOHNSTOWN DISASTER.

Very Latest Particulars.

GREAT LOSS OF LIFE

And Damage to Property.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 5. The resident portion of Woodvale Borough is completely wiped out. The property loss is estimated at \$3,500,000. On the hills above the wrecked village are clustered the several thousand inhabitants who escaped, and unless aid will be given them soon, they must perish of want, as starvation stares them in the face. They are so far above Johnston that relief parties have not yet reached them. Several have become demented and it is feared the horrors of madness must soon overtake them unless at once relieved. A large number of lives were lost.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 5. Two hundred thousand dollars in money and fifty thousand in provisions and clothing have been donated by the city in aid of the Johnstown sufferers.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 5. The best estimates this morning place the loss of life from 12,000 to 15,000. The amount of property destroyed by the flood will probably reach \$30,000,000. The Cambria Iron Works alone lost \$2,000,000 worth of property.

Arranging for Elections.

OTTAWA, June 5. The License Commissioners and other special agents of the Mowatt Government are busily arranging for the coming local elections. Several constituencies have already called conventions to select candidates, and every thing indicates that Mowatt is badly frightened, and will not risk another year's growth of public opinion.

Direct Steamship Service.

OTTAWA, June 5. Judge Bykerton, of Honolulu, who is here on his return trip from the United States, called on several Cabinet Ministers to-day. He affirms confidentially that if direct steamship service is established between Vancouver and Australia an extensive trade will develop between Canada and Hawaii.

Ashore.

QUEBEC, June 5. The signal service reports the bark Anna, bound for Quebec, and the schooner James Dwyer, of Nova Scotia, ashore near Cape Rodien light house, with the steamer Beaver ashore at Cape Magdalen.

HALIFAX, June 5. Bishops Chapel here was the scene of an interesting event this morning, Kate, the second daughter of the late George R. Anderson, being married to Frederick Kabbe, of the Royal Navy, and son of Staff-Commander Kabbe.

HALIFAX, June 5. The American schooner Mattie Winship has been released on a bond of \$3000, pending the action of the courts.

Another Cyclone.

HALIFAX, June 5. Granville has had a small cyclone. Two barns were toppled over and other damage done. The cyclone path was about 20 rods wide.
