Gillis' Statement Surprises Gaudet

Commenting last night on statements by Liberal candidate A. M. Gillis as reported in yesterday's Patriot, Queens County returning officer, A. W. Gaudet pointed out that "as returning officer he is not permitted to get involved in the political issues of the campaign, but did indicate his complete surprise at some of the statements aimed in his direction by Mr. Gillis."

Mr. Gaudet pointed out that "the guiding principle throughout was that of the convenience of the senior citizens involved," and referred to section 27, F and G of the General Election Instructions for Returning Officers which reads as follows:

"Any large acute hospital or institution which at the general election is likely to have a substantial number of permanent patients or inmates who are qualified as electors in the polling division comprising the hospital or institution, should be set apart as a separate polling division if, upon consultation with the superintendent, it appears that it is possible and desirable to establish a polling station within the hospital or institution at which the votes of the permanent patients or inmates who are generally so qualified to vote in a hospital or similar institution. Such temporary polling stations are generally entitled to vote in the polling division where they ordinarily reside and upon the same basis as their names should be registered. The only persons who are entitled to vote in a polling station established in a hospital or similar institution are the permanent staff residing ordinarily and continuously therein and the permanent patients or inmates who do not ordinarily reside in any other polling division. If such persons are otherwise qualified as electors."

In view of sections 16 (16) and 45 (14) of the Act, any sanatorium, home for the aged, chronic hospital, or other institution should also be set apart as a separate polling division.

As regards to Mr. Gillis' charge of no effort on Mr. Gaudet's part to register the patients at the Charlottetown Hospital and the Prince Edward Island Hospital, the Queens County returning officer merely directed the attention of Mr. Gillis to section 27, subsection 6 of those same instructions which read as follows:

Assaulting An Officer Results In \$200 Fine

In sentencing John Charles New Haven, was given an adjournment until June 22, due to the charge of assaulting a peace officer, Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. said "this court will not tolerate any person assaulting a police officer. They have an important job to do and should be permitted to carry it out with a minimum of interference."

Mr. New Haven, who was counselled by Gerald R. Foster, Q.C., was fined \$200 and costs or three months in Queens County Jail on the charge of assaulting Const. Harry W. Burns, RCMP, a peace officer engaged in the performance of his duties. The accused was given two weeks in jail to pay the fine.

Pleading guilty to having possession of 195 live shot lockers, Alfred Edward Gauthier, Rusticville, was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days in jail.

On the charge of theft of gasoline, valued under \$50, the property of Erich Hughes, West Beach, was given to Const. Donald Sours, pleaded guilty. Counsellor by John P. Nicholson, the accused was sentenced to a one-year suspended sentence and ordered to enter into a recognizance of \$500 with one surety of \$500.

Pleading guilty to a charge of speeding, Angus L. MacPhee, are the permanent patients or inmates and the members of the permanent staff who are ordinarily and continuously residing in such hospital, if such persons are otherwise qualified as electors."

All arrangements for polling stations for the County including those at Beach Grove Inn, the Provincial Sanatorium, and the Sacred Heart Home, had been cleared with all political parties concerned many weeks ago. Mr. Gaudet commented, and he could only express "complete surprise at the attitude of Mr. Gillis in this regard at the eleventh hour."

Liberal Candidate Declares PCs Tried To Pull Illegal Act

Liberal candidate Allison Gillis charged yesterday that the Progressive Conservative government, through the refusal of the chief electoral officer to allow polling stations at Beach Grove and the Sacred Heart Home is "merely trying to pull something illegal and get caught", and further charged that the PCs have threatened to make religion an issue in the current election.

"I have the highest confidence in the Catholic people and know that they will not allow the fine relations that exist between the religious groups of this city to be, in any way, strained by distorting the truth by those seeking political power."

"PEOPLE CONCERNED"

Referring again to patients who may lose their vote by the dropping of the poll at the Sacred Heart Home, Mr. Gillis said, "I, too, feel concerned about the list of electors prepared for the polling division in which such patients are included. Therefore, in an ordinary hospital, except as provided in subparagraph (4) of paragraph 24 of these instructions, the only persons who are entitled to have their names included in the list of electors prepared for the polling division in which such patients are included are the permanent patients or inmates who do not ordinarily reside in any other polling division. If such persons are otherwise qualified as electors."

BOARDS OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES AND TEACHERS

Only regularly licensed teachers may now be employed for the school year 1962-63.

Persons who have been absent from active duty as teachers for five or more years can be employed only if they undertake to attend a Refresher Course in Teaching Methods, as required by paragraph 13 of the "Regulations Governing the Granting of Licenses to Teachers."

Teachers who hold valid licenses and who have not yet obtained teaching positions for the school year 1962-63 should forward their names to the Department of Education, giving license classification, and years of experience; also indicating district area desired.

Permits-to-Teach to persons without professional training but with educational qualifications of Grade XII or better cannot be issued prior to July 3, 1962.
