The mails arrived in this city at 3 o'clock to-day.

The Newfoundland seal fishing fleet will probably number twenty-five vessels this spring.

LARGE quantities of Mussel-Mud are being conveyed by train to different sections of the country along the line of Railway.

A SIX-YEAR old daughter of Mr. Levi Shrade, was burned to death at Liverpool, N. S., on Wednesday last.

The Journal says Capt. W. P. Green, of Summerside, intends going extensively into the hen business during the summer.

THREE famous exiles—Sitting Bull, Ex-president Reil, and Ex-adjutant General Lapine, are finding shelter in the North West this winter.

The Manager and the Lessee of the Royal Opera House, Toronto, were, on the 16th inst., each fined \$20 and costs for holding a concert on Sunday night.

The prisoners Carroll, Kennedy, McLaughlin and Ryder, arrested for incendiarism and murder at Lucan, Ont., have been committed for trial in the Assizes.

A TROTTING MATCH between P. S. Brown's "Long John" and Mr. Hooper's "Zulu," takes place on the ice, at the East End of the city, to-morrow, for \$40 a side.

SINCE the "Northern Light" landed her passengers at Guernsey Cove, on Wednesday, no reports have been received from her.

A SAN FRANCISCO Police Judge has sentenced Denis Kearney to six months imprisonment in the House of Correction, and to pay a fine of \$1,000. The case will go to a higher Court.

A DESPATCH from Canso of the 16th says:—The schooner reported cast away on the ledges off Canso Harbor was the "Samuel," of Summerside, P. E. Island, owned by Capt. Hart. She was coal laden from Louisburg for Halifax. Cargo and vessel a total loss.

The Educational Association will meet in the Queen Square School, in the principal classroom, to-morrow evening, the 20th inst., at 7.30 o'clock, p. m. The subject of Corporal punishment in school will be discussed.

A SLIGHT FIRE—caused by gas escaping from a defective gas pipe—occurred at the residence of Mr. Thomas Burris, on Thursday night, at 9.40 p. m. A general alarm was given, and the engines turned out. The fire was extinguished with little difficulty.

A CONSTABLE was to-day tried before the Stipendiary Magistrate, charged with breaking the "Act regulating the cost of distresses levied for payments of rents" and a judgment was rendered to the effect that the said constable shall pay the sum of \$9.36, as a compensation and satisfaction for the unlawful charges which he made under a distress for rent. This will be a lesson for many constables, who do not scruple to wring heavy fees under distresses.

MISSING.—A man named Edward Patton, of P. E. Island, shipped on board the brig, "Sienna," which sailed from Halifax on the 8th, left the Sailors' Home on Saturday morning, 6th inst., and has not been seen or heard of since. He is about 5 feet 6 1/2 inches, reddish complexion, beard dark red, cut short; wore a Balmoral cap and blue top coat. He had no money when he left the Home. He arrived from Liverpool, G. B., by the last steamer.—*Hx. Herald.*

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 18.

After routine Mr. Couriel brought in a Bill to simplify criminal procedure in Quebec, by dispensing with Grand Juries in certain cases.

Mr. Domville re-opened the Budget debate. He objected to Mr. King speaking for St. John, and said, excepting for the fire, other cities had suffered greater depression. One factory had prospered—that of Mr. Parks—and if he (Domville) had suffered, still legislation should not be for one man or a single Province. With the Mezzanite railroad built, St. John could compete for the Western trade with any city. It has also the advantage in constant Ontario freight for the West India trade. Its people are dissatisfied and discontented, but the Tariff would yet prove satisfactory. The old rails brought all they were worth. He said he was sorry to see them go out of the country. Had he known of the rise he would have bought them himself. He wanted to see everything made in this country but rum—that should be imported, then we would get it pure. The duty should be taken off coal and put on iron. He contradicted Mr. King's statement respecting a rise in sugar, saying that sugar was no dearer, and if Redpath was benefitted, so much the better. He found no names in the St. John petitions, but those in opposition during the election. Why did they not ask Mr. Tilley to resign? He admitted that people were discontented, but that would pass away. The Government looked to the country, not to the Opposition for their support.

Mr. Cameron, of Huron, said he regretted that he said he had prepared a sheet to take notes of Mr. Domville's speech. It was still blank; he had not even told the House how much his (Domville's) own great enterprises in St. John had been benefitted by the N. P. Leaving Domville to the New Brunswick members, he declared that Sir Samuel Tilley had proved a false prophet. He had predicted the tariff would make both ends meet, yet he acknowledged a deficit of half a million a year, and would have a million or more next year, owing to the increased expenditure. He declared that Sir Charles Tupper's pretended admiration of Sir Samuel Tilley was a piece of political acting. It was not Tilley he envied, but Sir John, which showed what he wants. He said his speech was a jumble of buncombe and Munchausenism. He then proceeded to review Tupper's speech, and spoke till six, and concluded amid cheers.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 18.
A British gunboat has left Salonica for Catterona, to take to the British Consul—Mr. Blunt—the money demanded by the Greek brigands for the ransom of Lt.-Col. Syngde and wife.

NEW YORK, March 18.
A reliable telegram says there is no doubt but there exists a regular organization of Russian Nihilists in Paris, holding nightly sessions, and numbering 250 members.

LONDON, March 18.
The Council of the Irish Home Rule League has issued a fresh manifesto to the electors of Ireland, strongly attacking Earl Beaconsfield.

DEAR SIR.—When dry goods are imported into Toronto, Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Halifax, or other large places in the Dominion, the Custom authorities take one out of every five or ten packages for examination and appraisal. Here in Charlottetown every package has to be opened, examined and appraised by the Customs. I need not dwell on the trouble and inconvenience thus occasioned. Every importer here can speak of that feelingly; but I would ask, why should Charlottetown merchants be subjected to so much more trouble and loss of time than merchants elsewhere?
The time for importations to arrive will soon be here. Will none of the leading houses takes the necessary steps to have themselves relieved from the exceptional and obnoxious rules enforced by the Customs authorities? Surely the merchants here are as reliable and trustworthy as anywhere else.

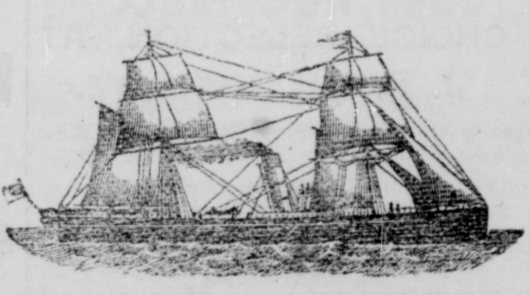

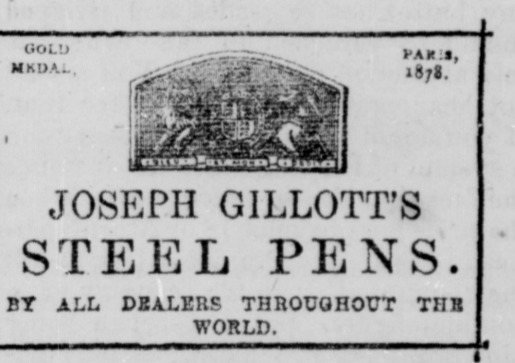
