Young Mother Stows Away On Ship For England

WOKING, England. (Reuters)—A homesick young English mother, wife of a Canadian, told a court here Saturday she stowed away aboard a British ship at Saint John, N.B., last month because she was "absolutely fed up" with life in Canada.

"I really did want to get home to England," said Mrs. Irish and life in Canada was "very hard."

The magistrates fined her \$5 for stowing away and, citing "exceptional circumstances," gave her six weeks to pay.

Mrs. Weagle, mother of two children and due to have another child next month, had lived in Canada since 1945, the court was told.

While working as a waitress at Saint John she persuaded two British seamen who had been drinking to smuggle her aboard the 5,628-ton Isaac Carter so that she could get home to her mother here.

Charges of aiding and abetting against the two seamen involved were adjourned until April 27.

Island-Born Archbishop

him in the front ranks of public speakers in western Canada and his writings showed a rare command of language and clarity of expression.

The late Archbishop was born at Crapaud, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Sinnott. While still in his infancy his family moved to Morell where his father took up farming and where the future prelate grew to young manhood.

He attended local schools and later graduated from St. Dunstan's University before continuing his studies at Montreal and later at the Canadian College in Rome. He was ordained there in 1900 and three years later was appointed secretary to the Most Rev. Donatus Sherrett, then Apostolic Delegate to Canada. In 1907 he was named Private Chamberlain to His Holiness Pope Pius X and was appointed Archbishop of Winnipeg in 1915, being consecrated the following year. The late Archbishop was appointed assistant to the Pontifical Throne in 1938 by Pope Pius XI and he was also named to the rank of Count of the Apostolic Palace.

His only surviving relative in this Province is Rev. Fr. A. L. Sinnott, a first cousin, who is now serving at Morell.

extensive territories rendered uninhabitable or unfit for human use, over and above the biological consequences that can result, either by the changes brought about by germs and micro-organisms or through the uncertain effect which a prolonged radio-active stimulus can have upon greater organisms, including man and upon their future offspring."

He said human genes could suffer changes that would alter man's course and result in deviations that caused "transmittable diseases and monstrosities."

Asks For Ban
"For our part, we will tirelessly endeavor to bring about by international agreements — always in subordination to the principle of legitimate self-defence — the efficacious proscription and banishment of atomic, biological and chemical warfare," he said.

"At the same time we ask: For how long will men insist on turning their backs on the salutary light of the Resurrection, seeking security instead of the deadly bias of new weapons of war?"

"When will the rulers of the nations realize that peace cannot consist in an exasperating and costly relationship or reciprocal terror, but in the Christian rule of universal charity?"

"When will it come about that the learned ones of the world will turn the wonderful forces of matter exclusively to purposes of peace? To enable man's activity to produce energy at a low cost which would alleviate the poverty and correct and unequal geographical distribution of the sources of wealth and war, as also to offer new arms to medicine and agriculture, and to peoples new fountains of prosperity and well-being?"

His speech Sunday was the first major address he has given since he became ill with what was described as gastritis.

The French war effort received another boost with disclosure Sunday of the arrival of U. S. Corsair fighter-bombers in Indo-China. It was the first time since the United States has undertaken large-scale military aid to the French and Viet Namese that Corsairs have been delivered.

The navy planes were delivered by U. S. Navy pilots to a French air base between Saigon and Hanoi from the U. S. carrier Salpan.

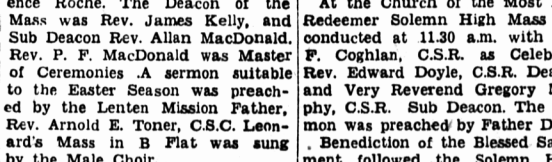
