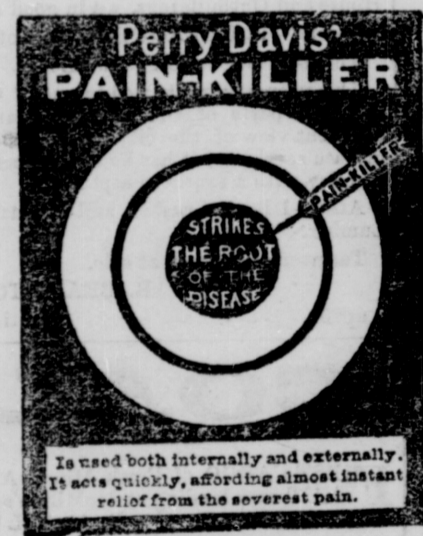

ODDFELLOWS' COLUMN.

Lodges in P. E. Island.

In 1891, the assessors of Portland, Me., returned the number of polls as 9950, and the census taken in December, 1890, showed a population of 39,595. There are 2784 Oddfellows in seven subordinate lodges, or one Oddfellow to 357 voters, and one to 1422 population.

This is believed to be the largest ratio of Oddfellows to voters and population of any city in the world. In the past 47 years the Order in Portland has paid for relief nearly \$1,033,000—an average of nearly \$80,000 per year for the past 14 years, and nearly \$80,000 for the past year. The invested funds amount to \$194,568.

Illinois lodges are responding to appeals for assistance from South Dakota with donations of from \$5 to \$10.

Oddfellowship is one of the finest fruits of Christian civilization and the staunchest bulwark of order and virtue.

Grand Sire Busboe was recently presented with a beautiful parlor clock by his lodge, Mantoe Lodge, of Raleigh, N. C.

The Chicago Oddfellow says that the anniversary celebration this year will eclipse any previous one held in the city of Chicago.

The Grand Officers will never encourage the formation of a new lodge unless men of the most estimable character stand at the head of the movement.

An appeal has been issued calling for assistance in behalf of the members of South Dakota, who are in distress through the complete failure of the crops of last season.

It is astonishing the number of Oddfellows' Halls that are being erected all over the country, and they are not being erected on paper either, but have tangible existence.

Prof. Joseph Kilder says: Everywhere through New Hampshire we hear of the greatest enthusiasm in the Order, with an unusual number of initiations and a large amount of degree work. The term is fair to be one of the most successful for several years past.

The Union Press is authority for the fact that Canton E. F. Jones, No. 30, has disbanded (not changed his name, as stated by the Grand Encampment) the paper discloses that at a meeting of the body on the 12th inst., all of the cheerleaders present, some twenty-five in number, took their discharge.

We remember some years ago taking occasion to remark in these columns that it would be money well expended if the Sovereign Grand Lodge and the Grand Lodges of the States would subscribe for some of the periodicals devoted to the interests of the order. In many of our orders in quite a number of states they have tried the experiment and found it worked beneficially—that in one instance a journal received \$2,000 in one year, and one in another state \$1,500.

It is within his power of the Grand Master, says the Statesman, to grant dispensation to confer degrees "out of season," or within the time specified by law, but not unless there is urgent necessity therefor. Some of the reasons given by judges for such dispensation holdy warrant him in granting the permission asked, and in one or two instances he has been obliged to refuse such request. The laws of the order cannot be set aside for trivial reasons, and no Grand Master should exercise the right to do so.

Baltimore Telegram: A brother out West received the military and first degree in the I. O. O. F., and before applying for the second and third degree was told that when he asked for these the question arose whether he could be given a hint on account of his disfigurement. The Grand Master of his jurisdiction decided in his favor. The Grand Sire was appealed to, and he gave a decision confirming the action of the Grand Master, to the effect that the second and third degrees shall be given to the brother by allowing him to read the ritual, see the floor work, and to have the passwords communicated to him written on a piece of paper, said paper to be immediately destroyed. This is said to be the first case of the kind on record.

A Little War in Gambia.

Advices from Bathurst, the capital of Gambia, the British West African colony, show Great Britain has another "little war" upon her hands. The native King of Gambia has for some time been in a disturbed condition of mind and has committed, or allowed to be committed, a number of depredations and abuses, from which the British administrators have been sufferers. The British administrator or Governor of Gambia, Gilbert Thomas Carter, C.M.G., put up with the King's conduct as long as possible, and finally sent an envoy, in the person of a prominent English officer, up the Gambia river to the King's headquarters. This envoy was charged with the mission of informing the King that he must behave himself in future and see that his subjects behaved themselves in future or else he might expect a visit of a disciplinary nature from the marine forces of the Queen of England.

The envoy carried out his orders and communicated the views of the administrator to the King. The latter, however, was not alarmed by the administrator's views. He ordered the English envoy to be seized and bound, which was promptly done. Portions of the envoy's cheeks and thighs were cut out by the King's body guard, and later the envoy and the pieces of flesh cut from his body were sent back to the administrator. With the envoy and pieces of flesh the King sent Mr. Carter the following message: "This is the King's answer."

The British authorities have taken prompt steps to send the King a suitable reply. Three British gunboats have already ascended the Gambia river to avenge the outrage on the envoy.

What We Drink.

The inland revenues of Canada for the fiscal year which ended on June 30 last, amounted to \$7,854,581. This was an increase of nearly \$900,000 over the previous year. Nearly the whole amount is collected in excise duties.

The proof spirits made during the year measured 5,091,475 gallons, or about one gallon for each man, woman and child in the Dominion. We are accustomed to speak and to think of Canadian whiskey as being almost wholly made from rye. This is an error; it is made very largely from corn. For the number of gallons of proof spirits mentioned above there were used 4,290,000 pounds of malt, 66,790,000 pounds of Indian corn, 13,404,000 pounds of rye, and small quantities of wheat, oats and barley. Nearly seventeen pounds of grain were used for each gallon of proof spirit.

The malt made during the year was 64,000,000 pounds. The malt liquor taken from wash-ponds measured 17,196,000 gallons, or more than three gallons for each inhabitant.

To be exact, the average spirituous liquors made in Canada average 883 gallons to each 1,000 inhabitants, the beer 3360 gallons, the wine 104 gallons, the tobacco 2,142 pounds. All show an increase over the preceding year except the tobacco.

News Notes.

Influenza is raging in England.

Seven calls of day of Pankonon detectives have gone to the coke regions in Pennsylvania.

Many Anarchists have been expelled from Rome for agitating for a general strike on May day.

A lady who died in Glasgow has bequeathed £70,000 to General Booth for the Salvation Army.

A receiver has been appointed for the Baltimore & Eastern Shore Railway. The road is insolvent. It has a mortgaged debt of \$4,000,000 and a floating debt of \$60,000.

Liberal papers are making much of a passage in Sir Charles Tupper's latest report of words on the political situation to the effect that if the Opposition had stuck to Mr. Blake's Mavern platform it might have been in power now. This is news only to the Liberals.

It is claimed that in the Eastern States veterinary surgeons make more money than doctors of medicine. The tramp who declared that the more he saw of men the better he liked his dog must have quite a number of fellow-philosophers among our neighbors.

Prince Edward Island, when the present political crisis is over, will apparently turn up in the column of provinces controlled by the Liberals. The people in the distribution of their political favors show much discrimination. The little affairs they leave to the party of little ideas; the control of the nation they give to the Conservatives.

The wheat situation is one of unusual strength. Prices have been steadily advancing for the past two months and they are still going up. On the market there is every reason to believe that fall wheat will touch \$1.25 before the new crop comes in. Stocks at all interior points are in farmers' hands are rapidly disappearing. The world's wheat crop for the past three years has been below the average consumption, and drafts have been made upon the reserves.

Benares, to which attention is now being attracted, is the heavenly city of the Buddhist. It is the seat of religion and learning in India. The annual pilgrimages made to its sacred walls from all parts of the land are directed by the Buddhist faith. The ground upon which the city stands is consecrated by the most reverential associations to the names of Siva and Vishnu. More religious frenzy might be stirred up in Benares than in any other spot in Christendom or heathendom.

Learn to Do Our Duty.

Charles Dickens says: "Unless we learn to do our duty to those whom we employ, they will never learn to do their duty to us." It is this matter of action and reaction are more nearly than we think. We get back what we impart—kindness, good works, fair and honest dealing toward servants or children or strangers or enemies, will bring back the same thing from them. He to himself will soon melt before love, and the kind and faithful man will be kindly and faithfully dealt with.—Cumberland Presbyterian.

Lieutenant Peary, of the United States navy, is about to lead an expedition to Greenland, with the view of defining the northern boundary of that country and finding out whether it is its extent to or beyond the North Pole. He has visited Greenland before, and believes that traveling northward by land over the great plateau of the interior will not be difficult.
